## The January 2015 NYINC Auction

Welcome to the sale! The January 2105 Stack's Bowers Galleries Official Auction of the New York International Numismatic Convention showcases "a collection of collections." In the pages that follow, we are proud to present specialized collections of such diverse coins as Philippines counterstamps, Spanish Colonial Proclamation Medals, Swedish Plate Money, German Crowns and Talers, ancient coins and many other specialties. Mixed in are highlights from important properties, ranging from single item consignments to large collections. All are presented here, for you, the numismatic enthusiast. Named collections abound, and include: The Stanley Aberdeen Collection of Swedish Plate Money, The John Adams Collection of Spanish Colonial Proclamation Medals, The Dr. Richard Aghababian Collection of Ancient Coins, The Ray Czahor Collection of Philippines Coins, selections from The Demarete Collection, and The Rockaway Collection of German Crowns and Talers. Other important consignments include a fine selection of Brazilian gold coins, Russian and Latin American gold and silver coins, and many others. In the three live sessions, we will offer over 1,800 lots, with an additional selection of over 1,650 lots in our Internet session.
Session A will commence on Friday, January 9 at 6:30 p.m. ET, with nearly 300 lots of ancient coins. Among these are popular ancient type coins, rare Greek and Roman issues, and a good selection of Roman Aureii. Highlights include: a silver Dodekadrachm of the Derrones, two Dekadrachms of Syracuse, a neat pair of Mysian electrum Staters, a strong selection of Judean coins, and fantastic gold aureii of the Roman emperors Octavian and Julius Caesar, Claudius, Antoninus Pius, Probus (and others). Also offered will be ancient coins from most issuing authorities and locales, in price points that will suit any collecting budget.
Then come world coins of the more "modern" age. Starting with coins of Albania and continuing through German coins, we present over 470 lots of gold coins, crowns, and minors in silver and copper. Latin American coins, long a specialty of ours at Stack's Bowers Galleries, include a unique and recent discovery: a lovely 1760/59 Colombian 8 Reales, the only known example of the date to exist. This is the second year in a row that a newly discovered and unique Colombian coin holds a prominent position in our Official Auction of the New York International Numismatic Convention. Another South American rarity offering good crossover appeal to collectors of African crowns is a Chilean 8 Reales minted at Santiago in 1764, bearing the Mozambique countertstamp for the decree of 1765 . Canadian collectors will be enticed by specimen 20 Cent of 1858 graded PCGS MS-64+ with a reeded edge and Demarete pedigree. A lovely gem Specimen 1914 Pattern Dollar of China signed by L. Giorgi will turn heads. A large selection of German States crowns and talers anchored by The Rockaway Collection provides a good transition spot and is highlighted by a very rare 1702 medallic taler of Brunswick Wolfenbuttel displaying allegorical scenes outlining the political strife of the time. Other rare coins, high grade examples of popular types, and special items fill in, rounding out a great auction session.

Session B will commence at 6:30 p.m. ET on Saturday, January 10 , and features coins from Ghana to Yemen, but begins with the specialized collection of Spanish Colonial Proclamation medals formed by John W. Adams. Spanish proclamation medals were issued to commemorate loyalty to new kings in the Spanish Empire and were produced in various colonial possessions throughout the ages. This collection focuses on the 18th century, as these also have a crossover appeal to collectors of United States medals, as they are listed in the Betts reference on medals related to colonial America. Mr. Adams' efforts in searching out these rare and slightly obscure items, and assembling them into a comprehensive collection have led to a better understanding of the series.
A large selection of Philippine coinage anchored by The Ray Czahor Collection and augmented by other important properties presents a once-in-a-lifetime offering of these fascinating, rare and important coins. Russian coins from a number of different consignors are highlighted by rare gold coins and silver Rubles, including two rare Proof gold 10 Rubles. Rare South African Proof Sets of 1892 and 1931, the latter pedigreed to The Demarete Collection, are important opportunities for the specialist. Swedish Plate Money from The Stanley Aberdeen Collection is highlighted by an 8 Schilling piece of 1715 struck during the Great Northern War.
Session C, our World Paper Money session, will be held at our auction gallery on the second floor of the Director's Guild of America Building (110 W. 57th Street) at 11a.m. ET on Monday, January 12. A diverse and exciting offering of 300 lots is strong in Middle Eastern notes, with a nice selection of Saudi Arabian notes, and a rare Palestine Currency Board 5 Pound note of 1927.
Session D, our Internet-only session, closes Tuesday, January 13 at 6 p.m. ET, and the nearly 1,700 lots of highly collectible coins and banknotes are offered in a separate catalog. Be sure to review these lots as well.
On behalf of the entire staff at Stack's Bowers Galleries, we thank you for participating in our January 2015 Official Auction of the New York International Numismatic Convention, and appreciate you ringing in the numismatic New Year with us! ## The John W. Adams Collection



John W. Adams has been collecting for nearly 60 years. After starting with Lincoln cent boards filled from circulation, he moved on to Proof Indian cents, to type coins, then large cents of the year 1794 and, finally, historical medals. He continues to collect the last avidly but, in order to hone his focus, has sold off portions of a very broad collection. Stack's Bowers Galleries was pleased to handle Mr. Adams' Indian Peace medals, including a gold 1693 Family medal of Louis XIV, in 2009.
As a collector advances in his or her interests, it is inevitable that knowledge becomes more important than the coins themselves. An eager student, Mr. Adams was able to gather a library, as well as visit leading institutions in this country, Canada and abroad. These activities led to the composition of dozens of articles and the publication of six books:
United States Numismatic Literature, Volume I
United States Numismatic Literature, Volume II
The Indian Peace Medals of George III
The Medals Concerning John Law and the Mississippi System Comitia Americana and Related Medals

Medallic Portraits of Admiral Vernon, Medals Sometimes Lie

This extensive corpus led to the American Numismatic Society bestowing upon Mr. Adams its highest award, the Archer M. Huntington Medal for lifetime achievement in numismatic scholarship. The Award Ceremony and celebratory dinner took place in Boston on April 26, 2014. So warm and vibrant was the support of family, friends and fellow numismatists at this function that Mr. Adams came to a new conclusion as to the meaning of it all: the hobby is only partially about the breadth of a collection and the quality of the coins. Rather, the unexpected but greatly-to-be-desired outcome of collecting is the sharing of knowledge and experience with persons of like mind. It is these lasting bonds of friendship that are the true treasures of the hobby.


## The Rockaway Collection

The Rockaway Collection was the proud and passionate pastime of an amateur collector whose love for American, European, and Chinese history influenced acquisitions from the 1960s to the 1990s. To the collector, every coin was an interesting story, a moment in time, an opportunity to research and be inspired by fascinating peoples and places that existed long ago. As such, the
coins, once amassed, were tended to rather than sold. It is why these pieces have been off the market for many decades. The recent passing of the collector is the reason The Rockaway Collection is now available. Future Stack's Bowers Galleries auctions will showcase additional World and U.S. coins from this marvelous collection.


## The Ray Czahor Collection



Ray started collecting coins and stamps in the early 1950s. After collecting over 5,500 world stamps, he quickly realized he hadn't even scratched the surface, and traded all his stamps, albums, and catalogs to a couple for their United States coin collection. To this day, he has maintained his interest in U.S. type sets, Buffalo nickels, Standing Liberty quarters, Walking Liberty halves and U.S. currency. His interest in Philippine numismatics began when he was stationed there in 1963, while a newly minted 2nd Lieutenant in the United States Air Force. He was fascinated with the history of the Philippines as it moved from Spanish rule through the United States' administration to the Philippine Republic. He was interested in the governments' varied impact on coins, tokens, medals and currency, including during the Japanese Occupation and Guerilla/Emergency notes. All areas of Philippine coinage had collectible interest for Ray, including the trials, patterns, varieties and low mintages that enhance the challenge of Philippine numismatics. Currently, Ray distributes an annual mail bid covering World War II books and all aspects of Philippine numismatics. He can be reached at cookiejarpi@verizon.net.

Ray purchased his first Philippine Counterstamp in 1964, an 1835 Y.II C/S on an 1754 Mexican 8 Reales coin for $\$ 50$ (not offered in the sale but part of his Philippine type set). He knew Pillar coins were very collectible, but with a Philippine counterstamp - wow! That purchase initiated his research into the history of these interesting coins, but little information was available in the Philippines. After returning to the United States in 1965, he found articles by Dr. P.I. DeJesus who listed several types of counterstamps. Ray began to search through dealer lists and at tables at coin shows and slowly added a few pieces to his collection. But it wasn't until the mid1980s that significant and new information was provided by Frank F. Gilboy, in an article in the June 1984 issue of the Barrilla, official publication of the Philippine Central Bank Money Museum. In the article, Mr. Gilboy explained how to date the individual counterstamps by examining the number of pearls in sequence in the crown of the counterstamp. From his examination of a number of examples, Mr. Gilboy was able to estimate the percentages of counterstamp strikings of each date. Ray's experience generally supports Mr. Gilboy's estimates of the relative rarity of the date of the counterstamp. This energized Ray's interest to find the scarcer dated counterstamps, and to start looking for them on rarer country host coins, varieties or overdated host coins, and particularly to search for higher grade host coins and counterstamps. Some countries such as Peru and Mexico provided many examples, but finding the coin and the counterstamp in VF to AU was the challenge!

## Philippines Countermarks

For anyone starting to collect the countermarked coins of the Philippines, below is a checklist of the basic types and some major varieties. The rarities assigned to each of these are based purely on the general type and do not account for scarce or rare host coins or host dates. Famed Philippines author and collector Pablo I. de Jesus came up with a general list by country and type from most the common to the rarest. Below is his list as seen in the Philippine Numismatic Monographs Number 16, August 1966.

1. Peru. The Lima mint of 1830-36 are the most common, but earlier dates 1822-29 are scarce. Cuzco mint is also scarce.
2. Mexico 1832-36, but the earlier dates are scarce, the hookneck eagle types and Augustinus are rare.
3. Bolivia.
4. Chile, Colombia. There was a special importation of Chilean pesos of 1834 and Colombian 8 Reales of 1835.
5. Guatemala, Argentina and Spain.
6. Brazil, U.S.A. and European crowns.
7. Spanish colonial including bust-type and pillar dollars with chopmarks.
8. Countermarks on minor coins.
9. Perforated coins countermarked on the hole.
10. "Manila" overstrikes are rare, especially 1829 and 1830.
11. Two or more countermarks on one coin are very rare.

The combination of the Pablo I. de Jesus list and the checklist below is sure to give any collector of Philippines countermarks a good start and a better understanding of this series. The Ray Czahor Collection of Philippines Countermarks contains a vast majority of types and varieties on the checklist as well as many rare host coins.

In this cataloger's opinion, these large Macedonian issues were likely produced in a different manner than that of most conventional ancient coinage. The Octodrachms of the Bisaltae, as well as the Octodrachms of Alexander I and the Dodecadrachms of the Derrones, were seemingly produced in a two part process. Flattening on the reverse would suggest the coins were struck with each die individually, rather than at the same time. The reasoning for this is most likely due to the coins massive size. The reverse design was the first to be struck onto the planchet, the coin would then be turned over and struck with the obverse design. Evidence of this can be seen on the coin offered here as there is some flattening to the triskeles on the reverse. The reverse design featured on this coinage, although partially incuse, would be purely ornamental rather than a function of pushing metal into the obverse die. These Dodecadrachms of the Derrones are perhaps the best example of this double striking minting process, as they display a triskeles on the reverse which is predominantly found flattened or mashed as a result of the secondary strike. The initial planchets were undoubtedly cast as many example are found with large air bubbles and regular formed flans. The piece offered here is struck on a well rounded planchet that allows for near perfect centering, with virtually every aspect of both obverse and reverse dies present. The evenness of the secondary strike was executed with evenly dispersed pressure allowing for a near full triskeles on the reverse, which is quite RARE. Their use in brothels seems supported by the ancient roman historian Suetonius (most famous for his biography on the twelve Caesars), who states that bringing a coin or other object with the effigy of the Roman Emperor into a brothel was an act of treason punishable by law. These licentious tokens seem a good work-around to using common coinage when visiting an erotic establishment. The obverse design mirrors that of the Erotic Frescoes found on the wall of the brothel in Pompeii. Well struck and choice for type, with excellent detail.

Agrippina was also Claudius's niece and immediately began replacing his advisers with men loyal to her. She also maneuvered her son from a previous marriage, the future emperor Nero, to the position of heir to the Empire, there by surpassing Claudius's biological son. With this accomplished, Agrippina murdered Claudius with poison, and her son Nero was hailed as emperor immediately afterwards. Claudius's son was then murdered to prevent any rival claimants. However, treachery begets treachery, and Agrippina found herself unable to manipulate her son as ably as she could with her late husband. She lived the last few years in a vain attempt to hold on to her authority and her life. A few light surface marks and a small scratch before the face of Claudius. For instance, some "Royals" exist with Central American countermarks from the 19th century, hence they were never sent to Spain for inspection. The current belief is that these were specially commissioned pieces, produced for ceremonial purposes or special events. One contemporary document discusses specially made coinage that was given out as gifts during a Royal wedding. In this case, the men were given 8 Reales, while the women were given 4 Reales. Regardless of their intended purpose, it is clear that these are specially made coins, that vary greatly in their method of manufacture than that of the traditional circulating coinage of the time. Small hole at 1 oclock that has been expertly repaired and virtually undetectable (evident when compared with the rubbing of the Lazaro plate coin, where the hole was still present). The story of Louis I rule as King of Spain is a short and sad one. He was named king of Spain in January of 1724 when his father Philip V abdicated in his favor. Shortly after, he became ill with smallpox and died in August of the same year. His reign is noted as one of shortest in Spanish history, having lasted for just over seven months. Upon the young king's death, his father Philip V returned as king rather than give the throne to his other son Ferdinand VI, who would have only been eleven years old at that time. Philip V continued to rule as King of Spain until his own death in 1746, at which point he was succeeded by his son Ferdinand VI. Although Louis I was only King of Spain for a short period of time in 1724, the mint of Potosi Bolivia struck coinage in his name in 1725,1726 and 1727. The continuation of this coinage is the result of the available channels of communication during the time. First, it would have taken many months for the news of the new king to reach Potosi, and it is clear from numismatic findings that new dies were not prepared until 1725. A similar set of circumstances would have occurred upon his death, as news was slow to travel. On the other hand, since the deceased king was the son of the returning monarch, there may have simply been less urgency to discontinue the design. The coinage may have continued to be produced in his name for a brief period as a form of remembrance. Nevertheless an EXTREMELY RARE and desirable type that is a key piece in any collection of Spanish Colonial or Latin American. Some minor doubling evident, which is normal for types of this king. ## CHILE

The Santiago Chile 8 Reales dated 1764 were struck from a single batch of silver, rendered on January 5th 1765. A total of only 23,346 pieces were minted, of which only 5 examples are confirmed to exist today. Unlike the Spanish Colonial mints located at Mexico City, Potosi, Bolivia and Lima Peru, the mint of Santiago Chile was not known for large outputs of silver coinage. Much like the mint of Nuevo Reino Colombia, the silver from the Santiago mint during this period was produced in small quantities and should be considered RARE. Unlike Mexico, Bolivia and Peru, which were rich with silver mines, the mines in Chile were abundant with gold. Most of the silver coinage produced at the Santiago mint was made from silver that was extracted while refining gold. When enough slag silver was collected it was then made into coinage. Due to their relatively small mintages, the silver coinage produced at the Santiago mint was predominantly produced for the local economy rather than export. Historically, on very rare occasions coinage of this mint has surfaced abroad; however, foreign trade was not the predominant function of silver coinage produced by this mint. A hoard of Colonial pillar 8 Reales was found in the wall of an old mission in Vietnam around 1990. This hoard gives some perspective to the relative rarity of Santiago Pillar 8 Reales circulating abroad compared to those of other colonial mints. The hoard consisted of some 400-500 pieces of mostly high grade pillar 8 Reales, predominantly of the Mexico City mint from the era of late Ferdinand VI to early Charles III. Among this group a single Santiago 8 Reales was found, a 17648 Reales that was later sold at auction by Ponterio \& Associates sale \#129 January 2004, lot \#1601. Through some strange anomaly or happenstance, the 1764 Santiago pillar dollar offered here somehow made its way to Africa some time shortly after it was minted, finding itself in Mozambique, possibly as a result of the slave trade. Countermarked in Mozambique with a large "MR" monogram by decree of August 20, 1765. Unique countermark and host coin combination, highly important as an African crown and possibly the only Santiago Pillar 8 Reales existent with a foreign countermark. The instructions for issuing the medals were written in Lima on January of 1814 and are as follows: "When the Governor General of the Araucanian Indians Villacura and other chiefs who have demonstrated faithful and strong feelings toward the cause of the King and the Spanish nation, rejected with recommended nobility the fraudulent offers of Chilean traitors, we will give them on behalf of the King and my most heartfelt thanks, each, a sign of how pleasant it is to me and should be the best monarch of the world their true behavior, a cane and a medal for this purpose that leads, encouraging them to continue holding the sacred cause we believe, without heeding the insidious suggestions of the rebels." A VERY RARE and highly significant Indian Peace medal issued during the War of Independence, in order to gain the allegiance of Native American to the Spanish crown. Lustrous. Nicely toned.

UNIQUE discovery coin. The fact that pillar dollars were minted at the Nuevo Reino Mint (Bogota) in 1760 has been known through numismatic literature for quite some time. Page 50 of A. M. Barriga Villalba's reference "Historia de las Casa de Moneda" states that in 1760, 2,008 Marcos, 6 Onzas, and 0 Ochavas of silver were minted in the form of Pesos (8 Reales), 1 Reales, Medio ( $1 / 2$ Reales) and Cuartillas ( $1 / 4$ Reales). However, it is unknown how this is broken down for each of the corresponding denominations. The existence of minor coinage dated 1760 has been known to the numismatic community for quite some time. Approximately a dozen examples of 17601 Reales are known, while the $1 / 2$ Real remains unique. The $1 / 4$ Reales it is a different matter, as the Colombian dies for the Cuartillas denomination did not contain a date at this time. Furthermore, Cuartillas were struck each consecutive year from 1759-1771 (with the exception of possibly 1770); therefore, assigning a specific date to them is not possible. Previous to the discovery of this coin, only three dates were known of Pillar 8 Reales produced by the Nuevo Reino Mint (1759, 1762 and 1770). It is estimated that approximately 15 examples of the 17598 Reales are known today (See Restrepo pg.113), although this number may be as high as 20 . Of the 17628 Reales, only two examples can be confirmed, one of which (Restrepo and Barriga Villalba plate coin) is housed in the Museum of the Casa de Moneda Bogota. The second example (Ex: Don Domingo de Irigoyen, Ex: Don Canaparo and Gilboy plate coin) was sold by Numismatica Ars Classica in March of 2002, Auction \#22, lot \#334 where it hammered for 260,000 Swiss Francs. There are rumors that a third example may exist, however this remains unconfirmed. In regards to the 17708 Reales, there are approximately 12 to 14 pieces known (Restrepo pg.120), all of which were found in the corner stone of a Church in Bogota in 2006. Prior to this discovery, 8 Reales dated 1770 were unknown to numismatists, even though there is a known mintage of 289 Marcos, 6 Onzas, and 0 Ochavas (see Barriga Villalba pg. 50). Unlike the Spanish Colonial mints located at Mexico City, Potosi, Bolivia and Lima, Peru, the mint of Nuevo Reino was not known for large outputs of silver coinage. All Colombian silver from this period was minted in small quantities and should be considered RARE. Unlike Mexico, Bolivia, and Peru, which were rich with silver mines, Colombia was not. To the contrary, the mines in Colombia were abundant with gold from which silver was a byproduct. Most of the silver coinage produced at the Nuevo Reino mint was a result of excess metal that was extracted while refining gold. When enough slag silver was extracted, it was then collected and made into coinage. For this reason there are large gaps in the dates that 8 Reales were minted. It is interesting to note that mintage figures do exist, stating that 8 Reales were produced in 1756 and 1761, however no example are known to have survived today. The unique 17608 Reales offered here features a few interesting and distinct features. First and foremost the piece exhibits a clear overdate 1760/59 (the only known overdate for a Colombian Pillar 8 Reales). While there are multiple dies known for the 1759 , the pillar side die is an exact die match to lot \#296 in the July 1996 Bonhams auction of the Alexander Patterson Collection. The assayers initials on the 1760 are arranged "JV" similar to that of the 1759 Nuevo Reino 8 Reales of Ferdinand VI. For all other Nuevo Reino 8 Reales of Charles III (1762 and 1770), the assayers letters are arranged "VJ", showing in the opposite order. The pillar side die features yet another variant with a large "V" in the spelling of the kings name "CAROLVS", rather than "CAROLUS" as found in 1762 and 1770. A remarkable and UNIQUE discovery piece that is sure to be one of the centerpieces of its new owner's collection.

The host coin had been previously revalued to 3 3/4 Reales with a type KK "crowned L" countermark, nearly two hundred years earlier in ca.1650-52 (C-17.3). The countermarks applied to this coin tell an incredibly interesting story, an almost unbelievable testament to this coin's life as a piece of circulating money. The initial host coin is a Spanish Colonial 4 Reales, struck at the mint of Potosi Bolivia in the late 1640's. During this period the Potosi mint underwent a massive investigation concerning the debasement of its coinage, prompting a visit by the Royal Inspector Don Francisco de Nestares Marin, under the orders of King Philip IV of Spain. The investigation was prompted after other countries began to no longer accept coinage from the Potosi mint in trade, as they were found to be of substantially debased silver. In fact, due to this debasement, countries like the Netherlands began countermarking other cob coinage with the Order of the Golden Fleece, assuring the correctness of the metal content. Upon the completion of the investigation at the Potosi mint in 1649, it was concluded that coinage leaving the mint was in fact of insufficient metallic content and debased. Based on these findings, a number of mint officials were found guilty and persecuted. The mint treasurers, silver buyers and assayers were either hung, beheaded or put in prison. To distinguish the new coinage of good metallic content from the old the coinage that was debased, the overall design of new coinage was totally modified. The old "cross and shield" design was replaced with "pillar and waves". As a part of the reform on October 1, 1650, all Potosi 4 and 8 Reales coinage struck over the previous 25 years was ordered to be countermarked and devalued. The old 8 Reales were to be countermarked and devalued to $71 / 2$ Reales while the 4 Reales were devalued to $33 / 4$ Reales, hence the crowned "L" countermark applied to this coin. The coins were then allowed to circulate for a period of a few years, at the end of which they were ordered to all be melted down. The reason for not immediately withdrawing them from circulation to be melted, was to avoid a massive coinage shortage. In fact, most of the devalued coinage was melted down and re-coined. Most surviving examples come from shipwreck finds, such as the "La Capitana", where the cargo was en-route to Spain to be melted down. That being said, this coin should have been melted down in the mid 1600's. The miraculous factor is that somehow, this coin was still in circulation in Central America in the mid 1800's. It was then countermarked with type IV 1846 Costa Rican dies and re-validated once more, raising the value from 3 3/4 Reales back to that of the initial 4 Reales. A small assay mark is also noted at 11 O'clock, presumably this was done prior to the Costa Rican countermark as a result of testing the metal prior to countermarking. The fact that this coin exists at all, with both Bolivian and Costa Rican countermarks nearly two hundred years apart is mind baffling, and should be considered a total anomaly. UNIQUE and one of the most interesting countermarks this cataloger has had the privilege of attributing.

# The First Decimal Crown of Ecuador Tied for Finest Certified by NGC 



## ECUADOR

Designed by local Ecuadorian artist Emilia Rivadaneira as marked with small capital letter "E.R." below bust. Emilia was the sister of Manuel Rivadaneira who received the contract for the first Ecuadorian Postage Stamp. The idea for instituting a new decimal coinage system was presented to congress in November of 1856 with the idea of replacing the old debased real system. By article 5 a fixed period of two years was set for instituting the new decimal system (From October 15th 1858, or sooner if possible). The budget for 1857 provided 18,000 pesos, 8,000 pesos of which was intended for development of the mint. In accordance with the decree, in state offices 5 Francos pieces were to be accepted and paid out at 10 Reales of the decimal system or at 9 of the base coinage. This proved highly ineffective as the official rate often differed from that found in the marketplace. Hence 5 Francos circulated in the Imbabura market at the rate of 10 Reales, while the capital accepted them at 9 , and in Guayaquil they were being accepted at 8 . This caused severe damage to the economy of Ecuador and was disastrous with foreign trade. According to Carbo 14,259 pesos of silver coins were struck in 1858, presumably these are 5 Francos since no other coins were minted this year. On March 22nd of the following year a massive earthquake occurred in Ecuador. Serious damage was caused throughout the city of Quito, including what Architect Melvin Hoyos Galaza described as "The end of the Quito Mint". The damage to the mint was so severe that it was not repaired until 1861 by an 8000 peso loan advanced by the Banco Particular. From 1685 until 1692, the two brothers ruled jointly and without incident until the Hanoverian prince electorship was created, and neither brother received the office. Upon the outbreak of the War of Spanish Succession (1701), when Anton Ulrich made a pact with France in defiance of Emperor Leopold I, the Principality of Wolfenbuttel was thusly invaded by the now strengthened Hanover and Luneberg. This resulted in Anton Ulrich being stripped of his Ducal powers and becoming essentially an outcast. Rudolph Augustus briefly became sole rule once more and signed a treaty to end the hostilities and return his younger brother to the Emperor's grace. To illustrate this precarious fraternal situation, the obverse of this Taler displays a pair of horses, both hitched to an orb, emblazoned with the combined monogram of both ruling brothers "RAV", suspended between them as they strain in opposing directions unable to separate the two halves, even with aide from a nearby unicorn and lighting bolts from the heavens. This may seem a straight forward if odd visual metaphor, but it is actually based on a real event in the recent history of German science. In 1654 scientist and mayor of Magdeburg, Otto von Guericke, demonstrated his newly designed vacuum pump and the basic concepts of atmospheric pressure, by fitting together two halves of a metal sphere and then creating a vacuum within them, creating a seal which could not be broken even when attached to opposing teams of fifteen horses. Thus we have a recent and mystifying event fresh in the cultural zeitgeist being used to show the inseparable nature of this fraternal co-regency. The reverse displays the allegorical second half of the brothers' gaffe, as well as the outcome of Guericke's experiment. The same monogrammed orb is seen split in two by a simple twist of the wrist on a pressure valve, the "RA" half (Rudolph Augustus) is left standing while the "AV" half (Anton Ulrich) has fallen aside. An impressive and immediately attractive piece combining the political and scientific developments of the age, with the masterful visual storytelling of a medalist. ## The John W. Adams Collection of Spanish Colonial Proclamation Medals

## By Richard Ponterio

The John W. Adams Collection of proclamation medals offers collectors a rare and in some cases unique opportunity to acquire highly significant and seldom offered historical medals. Mr. Adams focused his collection primarily on medals pertaining to events that took place in the New World prior to the independence of the United States in 1776. The collection predominantly consists of medals from the reign of Philip V dated 1701 up until the reign of Charles III dated 1760-61, however a small number of slightly later dated medals are also included. The John W. Adams Collection is by far the most advanced cabinet of these early medals to ever be sold at public auction, as well as the most advanced collection of its nature that we are aware of, current or past. It features many rarities, along with several items that are believed to be unique, and is the culmination of many years of hard work on the part of Mr. Adams, scouring auctions catalogs, price lists, coin shows and other sources. During the period Mr. Adams was collecting, several major old time collections came to market, allowing him to acquire many incredibly rare pieces, and in some cases unique medals that had never been privately offered. Simply stated, not only was John meticulous in his collecting, he was also collecting at the right time.

The largest collection of general proclamation medals (Philip II-Alfonso XIII) ever assembled came to market in the mid 1990s, sold through Ponterio \& Associates. That collection was assembled over more than 30 years, during which time the collector had assimilated several other major collections into his own. The collection was so extensive that it had to be sold over several years, with the most notable portion, Sale \#87, sold in April 1997 in a stand-alone catalog of the medals of Spain and Latin America (with the exception of Mexico). This collection was larger in mass than the Adams Collection, and it covered all of the Spanish monarchs up until modern times, including medals of peninsular Spain. However, the section of that collection containing early New World proclamation medals was much smaller than the Adams Collection. Several major rarities from that collection were sold to Mr. Adams either via private treaty or at auction
and many of the medals offered here with a Ponterio \& Associates provenance from that era were from that collection.

In October of 2000, a second major collection (Lic. Alfredo Porraz) was auctioned by Ponterio \& Associates in Sale \#109. The Porraz Collection was assembled over many decades and was one of the major collections used as source material for Frank W. Grove's reference "Medals of Mexico Vol. 1 Medals of the Spanish Kings". Once again many of the rarities from this collection were acquired by Mr. Adams, including the Yucatan medals of Luis I and Ferdinand VI as well the Tabasco medal of Charles III. Shortly after the sale of the Porraz Collection, the Lavin Collection was dispersed. Like the Porraz Collection, this collection was also among the major collections examined by Frank Grove when creating his work on medals. This collection was sold privately and dispersed very quickly into collections. Fortunately Mr. Adams was able to acquire some rarities he needed, including a Yucatan medal of Luis I Grove-LI-17 (plate coin).

Knowledge of the collections that came to market during this period helps better understand the extreme rarity of many of these medals. In the past few years, several collectors have asked, "What happened to all of the proclamation medals that used to be on the market? In the 1990s, it seemed that every catalog had a section of proclamations, and now you rarely see them." Unknown to most collectors the material that was available during the 1970s-2000s came from several major old time collections. Hence the quantity of medals available during that time is not indicative of rarity or availability. These circumstances allowed the Adams Collection to become the apex of all early proclamation collections. Assembling a collection of comparable magnitude in this day and age is highly improbable.

Some collectors reading this might ask, "What exactly are proclamation medals?" In short, proclamation medals were normally produced by a city, but in some cases were made by a church, bishopric, college or other entity. These medals were symbols, showing loyalty and allegiance to the new
ruling monarch. In many cases this was an event of great importance, often with lavish festivals and ceremonies lasting for several weeks. As a general rule, a platform or stage was erected for oath swearing ceremonies, and in many cases proclamation medals were thrown from this platform to the crowd below. In one documented case the Viceroy held an image of the new king in one hand, while throwing medals to the crowd with the other. In Buenos Aires the proclamation ceremonies for Ferdinand VI lasted for 21 days and included huge feasts, opera, music, bullfighting and dance; it was the largest festival held in the city during colonial times.

The survival rate of proclamation medals is remarkably small when compared to production figures. They were made of precious metal, predominantly silver, but in some cases gold or bronze. As many were thrown to the crowds during proclamation ceremonies, they were more likely to be spent or melted than saved. As a general rule the earlier medals
(Philip V-Charles III) are much rarer than the later medals of Charles IV and Ferdinand VII. Many of the early medals are found holed to be worn as a medallion by the upper class. If a new king was proclaimed, existing medals were often replaced with those of the current reigning monarch. Thus many of the earlier medals were melted down and the metal repurposed. A large number of the medals from this early period are exceedingly rare, ranging from unique to only a few examples known. It is also almost certain that other proclamation medals were produced in contemporary times but are not currently known to exist. It has been a joy and an honor to view and catalog this many early proclamation medals in one collection. I commend Mr. Adams for assembling such an important collection, and hope that potential buyers appreciate the hard work and effort required for such an accomplishment.

Medallic die axis. VERY RARE fully round presentation strike or "Royal", struck on a specially prepared planchet. The exact reason as to why these specially made pieces were produced is unknown. On theory is that these pieces were struck to prove the quality of the coins from the Mint. They were produced on specially manufactured cast round planchets, as opposed to cutting blanks from the end of a silver bar. Special care was also employed in striking, as they are nearly always precisely executed with well-centered dies. Another theory offers the possibility that they were submitted for inspection to the Viceroy and possibly even the King of Spain himself. Although possible, this theory is less likely and there is evidence against this. For instance, some "Royals" exist with Central American countermarks from the 19th century, hence these examples were never sent to Spain for inspection. Shipwreck evidence further discredits this theory as two Mexican "Royals" were found during the salvage of the Dutch wreck of the "Rooswijk", which was on route to the East Indies (hence not in route to Spain for inspection). The current belief is that these were specially commissioned pieces produced for ceremonial purposes or special events. One contemporary document discusses specially made coinage that was given out as gifts during a Royal wedding. In this case the men were given 8 Reales, while the women were given 4 Reales. Regardless of their intended purpose it is clear that these are specially made coins and that the method of manufacture varies greatly from that of traditional circulating coinage of the time. The first "Royal" coinage was produced in Mexico under the reign of Philip II; there are two known examples. Under Philip III the first dated "Royals" appear in 1607; prior to this all "Royals" were undated showing legends ending in "DEI GRATIA" or some variant there of. Although these pieces are undated. it is possible through stylistic differences and design changes to arrange these in some semblance of order. The first "Royal" coinage of Philip III exhibit a crown which is attached to the coat of arms without a lower arc (similar to the coinage of Philip II; see Lazaro No.33). Shortly thereafter the coinage of Philip III takes on its own style, as the crown becomes detached with a lower arc. Although undated, the piece offered here was likely produced some time around 1600. It clearly shares the same reverse die as Lazaro No.33, which is an early "Royal" with the crown style of Philip II. Further, the obverse die appears to be a totally unpublished variant, where "GRATIA" is arranged with a hyphenated spelling "GRA*TIA". Struck on a large round planchet with full legends. Thus, was not included in the famous sales of his collection sold by Stack's and Coin Galleries in the 1980's and 1990's. The coin subsequently traded privately over the last nearly three decades, before being certified by PCGS and being sold to the current owner. This piece displays medium silver surfaces with some "flash" in the fields. Well struck and attractive. A major rarity in this series, the first available since August 2001, that piece is in an ANACS EF-45 holder, which sold for $\$ 22,000$. With presidential elections closely approaching, President Kruger desperately wanted to release new coinage into circulation as soon as possible; however, at this time the Pretoria mint was still under construction. Kruger not wanting to wait contracted with the Royal Prussian mint in Berlin to produce the first series of coinage. This proved to be a mistake that nearly cost Kruger the election. The German die engravers were unfamiliar with the style of wagon used in South Africa and engraved them in the style of a European wagon. Although the design was well executed, the wagon was depicted with two shafts and two equally sized wheels. This differed from the normal "Single Shaft" wagon or "Voortrekker wagon" used in South Africa which typically was depicted with a much larger wheel in the back. Although this seems like a very subtle difference, it nearly cost Kruger the presidency. Kruger's political opponents immediately noticed the incorrect depiction of the "Voortrekker wagon" on the national coat of arms and declared this "an insult", insisting that the engraver Otto Schultz initials "OS" represented the Dutch word for an Ox. Kruger took full ownership for this error and quickly had the appropriate design changes made. Interestingly enough, only the 5 Shilling is of the "double shaft" type, while the 2 and $21 / 2$ shilling are both of the correct "single shaft" type. A mostly well matched set with the 6 Pence to 2.5 Shilling pieces being PROOF 64+ or PROOF 65. The two outliers are the 5 Shilling which is slightly lower proof grade and the 3 Pence which has a very light track mark bisecting the obverse horizontally and earning it a details grade. ## The Plate Money of Sweden

## Reprinted from Ponterio \& Associates, Inc., Sale \#39, January 27, 1990, The "Nicobar" Find

Between 1644 and 1776 the government of Sweden issued one of the most interesting and unusual forms of currency plates of copper stamped with marks of value to circulate as money. On viewing examples of the different denominations which were in use, ranging from $1 / 2$ to 10 Daler, it is hard to view these as a "money of convenience," at least in our frame of reference.

The Swedish Falu mine has been producing copper since the Middle Ages. In fact, the mining company there, "Stora Kopparbergs Bergslag," is considered to be the oldest commercial firm still in existence. During the 16th century, copper production in Sweden represented only a small fraction of that produced in all of Europe, but an increased in the demand for copper by Spain for a subsidiary coinage and reduction in continental copper production increased the importance of Swedish copper international trade. During the first half of the 17th century it has been estimated that Swedish copper accounted for two-thirds of the needs of Europe even though that production amounted to only 3,000 tons or so in 1650 .

The primary coinage of Sweden during this period was of silver and this had to be imported as there was little, if any, domestic production. Copper, therefore, played a prominent role in maintaining the silver coinage of Sweden as it was exported to other European trading centers, primarily Amsterdam, where it would be sold and silver purchased. A minor coinage in copper did circulate in Sweden and here we encounter an usual thing; different value structures for coins of like denominations but of different metallic composition.

The Riksdaler of Sweden was similar to that of the other northern European countries bearing the likeness of the sovereign, coats of arms, etc., and being of an international standard of fineness and weight which remained fairly stable. Daler Silvermynt (Daler SM) was a unit of reckoning or account relating to a value based on silver; it need not have been actual coin. In the same light, Daler Kopparmynt (Daler KM) reflected a unit of accounting based on copper, coined or not. The differences in these units is found in the successive devaluations of the copper coinage in reference to silver coins of the same face values. Daler KM was also an accounting unit used by the general public. The plate money of Sweden was always struck and valued in Daler SM denominations.

Swedish officials were well aware of the impact their copper had on European markets and how, if production was even slightly reduced, increased demand and prices would follow quickly. They also realized that storage of copper which could not be immediately sold (if the price wasn't "right" at the moment) would also reduce supplies of available copper and tend to maintain a higher price. Another means of reducing the amount of copper available to European markets was to
increase the use of copper in domestic coinage; this could quickly be reversed and coins exported when market conditions made it feasible. As will be seen, this occurred time and time again with plate money.

The first Swedish copper coinage of 1624 consisted of $1 / 2$, 1 , and 2 ore denominations; these denominations were chosen to correspond with the same face values of silver coins, the value of the copper equal to the value to the silver in comparable pieces. Although linked by denomination, the values fluctuated according to the open market prices of the metals: where silver maintained a fairly constant level, the value of copper changed frequently, often drastically. A great decline in the value of copper in 1624 - when the price went from 131-1/2 Daler per skeppund ( 136 kilograms) to 150 Daler within a short time, then dropping to 90 Daler KM or 60 Riksdaler - caused great depreciation of copper money in the country. It became reasonable for people to exchange riksdalers for the low-priced coppers and sell them abroad at a profit.

Between 1625 and 1638 the exchange values between silver and copper fluctuated greatly, finally settling with copper holding a value about $20 \%$ less than sliver: this relationship was finalized by law in 1643. However, it was understood that increases in the price of copper would occur and upset this balance, and the government acknowledged that copper coinage might be used as a commodity. This view brought copper coins into a new light and role in the coming year.

The Swedish government realized the great prospect of exporting copper coins as commodities, but closely examined how minting costs would reduce their profit margins. For example, the 1 ore coins, of which there were 32 per Daler (although this ratio varied from time to time), was acknowledged to have a much higher unit minting cost per Daler than in minting a single Daler coin. In 1643 the Privy Council recommended minting copper in the form of small plates in $1,2,3$, and 4 Riksdaler denominations. The minting of these pieces would significantly reduce moneying costs and offer a convenient manner to transport coined copper.

Plate copper - plates of unrefined copper a few centimeters thick and of a rectangular shape - had been produced at the Falu mine for years; this was a very practical form for handling and transporting copper. In fact, the first plate money issued - the 10 Daler SM of 1644 - weighed 19.72 kilograms. To indicate the value of this plate, and to show that it was indeed a coin, they were stamped in each of the corners with a circular seal bearing the initials of Queen Christiana, the date, and the crown; the value was denoted in a circular stamp in the center of the plate. This particular means of stamping plate money continued through all the subsequent issues.

The very fact that copper was worth so much less than silver (8090 times for the same weight) made the range in copper coinage huge, from the 1 ore to the 10 Daler piece 400 times heavier and larger! This vast difference makes it hard to believe that many considered the 10 Daler plate to be a true, circulating legal tender item. Indeed, most of these giants were exported within a few years of issue. A total of 26,774 of the 10 Daler plates were stuck in 1644-45; 21,317 were known to have been shipped abroad by the end of 1646. Today fewer than 10 examples are known to exist.

Although the 10 Daler plate was a convenient way to transport copper and cost $30 \%$ less to mint than a comparable value of lower denomination round coins, it was probably considered to be a bit too large for convenience in trade; to point this up, the largest denomination in subsequent issues of plates was 8 Daler. This new denomination plate could be more readily handled and transported, or stored as an asset while lower denomination plates ( 1,2 , and 4 Daler) were aimed at general circulation and usage as money.

During the next 15 years further issues of plate money came out at the rate of 56,60 , and 60 Riksdaler per skeppund. This consequently was reflected in a reduction in the weight of a 1 Daler plate from 1.81 kilograms in 1649 to 1.62 in March of 1660 , and finally to 1.5 kilograms in November of that same year. Once again, a common situation occurred; older, heavier money was driven from circulation being replaced by a new money of lighter weight and lower value. Whereas Sweden maintained silver as its primary coinage, a lack of silver in 1660 caused a large issuance of copper coinage, fixed at a rate of 1 to 3 between silver and copper coins. In other words, 4 Daler SM corresponded to 12 Daler KM. This rate remained in effect until 1673 when warfare between England and Holland disrupted Swedish trade with Amsterdam. This war, and the Swedish war with Brandenburg (167475 ) and Denmark (1676) caused further difficulties for the

Swedes by cutting off foreign trade; the large quantities of copper coinage on hand in Sweden caused the exchange rate with silver to fluctuate again.

Between 1675 and 1679 large numbers of plates were stored or deposited in the Riksens Standed Bank which then supported the Treasury with loans. As had occurred before, when the overseas price of copper became attractive, the government banded private exportation of the metal; this was done to maintain the high price and to allow the Bank to be the sole official supplier, and for the government to indirectly benefit from the profits of the Bank. Plate money continued to be issued in large quantities until 1690 when a Royal Decree started that as long as copper was worth more abroad than at home in the form of coinage, State-owned copper would be exported and minting would not be considered unless the foreign prices fell. Private parties, however, could do whatever they wished with their own copper. This wholesale exportation of copper enabled Sweden to obtain the quantities of silver which appeared in large issues of silver coinage. In 1698 copper plates were no longer considered to be coinage per se, but as a form of commodity subject to various export restrictions.

Coinage in copper did not resume until 1709 at which time Danish attacks on Sweden disrupted the export trade in copper (again). At that time the value of copper was 120 Daler SM per skeppund; plates were issued in large quantities until 1714 when a considerable rise in the price of copper made their minting less profitable. As usual, an export ban came into effect to reduce private exportation of the metal.

In 1715 King Charles was forced to raise large sums of money to repay loans taken to support the various wars of the preceding years. To do this the metal content of plate money was drastically altered from 120 to 180 Daler per skeppund. Old plates were to be countermarked to indicate revaluation, and new plates had a rhombic instead of a circular center stamp. This revaluation made it economically impossible to
export plates, and between 1715 and 1716 about 3 million Daler SM was issued in plate form. At the same time a series of token coinage came out - money of necessity - to generate liquid capital for the government on a supposedly shortterm basis. This proved to be very successful for the government as the tokens circulated at the same par value as coins of a higher metal content value. The government later gained again when the token coinage was redeemed at quite a bit less than the originally promised exchange redemption value.

Until 1717 very little plate money had been redeemed for the token money of necessity. To encourage such exchanges a Royal decree was issued which ordered the devaluation of plate money by one-third, effective March 1, 1718. People seeking redemption at full value after that date would be offered only tokens, bonds, or paper money in exchange. Redeemed plates received an additional stamp (the Lion of Gotha on a shield and the date, 1718); unstamped plates were devalued as specified. Another decree banned the exportation of unstamped plates, and yet another issued a few days later ordered the confiscation of all plates not bearing the new counterstamp. Again, within days another decree ordered that an additional round stamp bearing three crowns was to be placed on the reverse of those plates with the Lion of Gotha mark. Further decrees and acts stated that those plates with the both new stamps would be valid; no other plates would be worth the value stamped on them if issued prior to 1717. Researcher Bertel Tingstrom has determined in this research of extant plate money that only about $25 \%$ of the plates owned by the general public in 1718 had been submitted for the State-mandated restamping.

Minting of plate money resumed in 1720 with 2 and 4 Daler denominations, the 4 Daler weighing 3 kilograms; large numbers of these were quickly exported. For the next 25 years, the price of copper remained fairly stable, as did the issuing of plates. However, changes in the laws regulating banking activities and the use of banknotes increased the overall use of paper money while the use of plate money declined. The increased banknote circulation soon caused a shortage of plates, and as usual export bans were in effect from 1742 to 1744. To ease the shortage of smaller plates, lower denomination banknotes were introduced to help in making change in what had earlier been the only banknote denomination, 50 Daler KM. The falling value of banknotes caused by huge issues, and the shortage of plates caused by higher copper prices overseas, forced the government to restrict the minting of plates; between 1745 and 1750, and again from 1757 to 1767, plates were issued in very small quantities. The following indicates the official view of the non-importance of plates at the time; in 1761 the mint at Avesta was destroyed in the fire. That portion of the mint which produced round coins
was immediately rebuilt; that part which produced plates was not reopened until 1767! Although few plates were being produced, large number were being brought by the Bank, evidently intending to export them at some convenient time in the future.

The coinage act of 1776 instituted a new system of coin reckoning wherein plates were considered to be only commodities. In fact, when the Riksdaler became the official money unit of currency in 1771, plates were banned as money. In the following decade many of the plates remaining in Sweden were shipped overseas due to the continued rise of copper prices through the 1780s.

After a break of 10 years, the coinage of plate money was resumed in 1786 although the plates were no longer included in the mint accounts as coins. The denominations or other markings of these issues are unknown to us today as the plates were primarily for the commercial or export trade; it is probable that they were of the shape and weight of the old 4 Daler plates. There are several accounts which indicate that plates were being struck as late as 1809 , mainly for export, and in the same form as before. It is not known if all plates struck after 1776 carried the 1768 date as so few have survived to the present time. It is known that large numbers of plates were shipped to the Far East with the Danish Asiatic Company's shipping list denoting major shipments of "Swedish minted copper money" during the period 1776-1803.

And so the plate money of Sweden passed from being a convenient manner of handling copper coinage for large transactions, and frequently as a handy means of conveying a commodity, in history. Based on mint records it is estimated that nearly 48 million plates were issued between 1644 and 1776; as of 1986 , fewer than 11,000 examples were known to exist. These examples of a financial experiment which endured over 130 years before being finally abandoned represents a fascinating episode in numismatic and financial history.

Information for this article was obtained primarily from "Plate Money - The World's Largest Currency" by Bertel Tingstrom. This excellent survey and study examines all aspects of plate money of Sweden; it has a wealth of information on mining and minting techniques, detailed information on government policies, as well as many charts, tables, graphs, and appendices which add greatly to the value of the book which is also lavishly illustrated. Anyone remotely interested in plate money of Sweden should be an owner of this book.

## My Introduction to Swedish Plate Money

## By Kent Ponterio

Swedish plate money will always hold a special place in my heart. I remember vividly from my teenage years, my father flying to South Africa and meeting with the salvage team of the Nicobar. That meeting later resulted in our taking delivery of close to 3,000 pieces of Swedish plate money recovered from that wreck. The actual weight was several tons, making the logistics of moving them interesting, to say the least. Initially the plates were crated up into long wooden boxes, not unlike how they would have been packed in contemporary times. From there, they were freight shipped to the San Diego airport, and we made dozens of trips transporting them in my mother's Ford station wagon. Of course, hauling such mass comes with consequences, as after a few trips we broke the suspension in my mother's car. For the next few months, my parents' garage contained thousands of pieces of Swedish copper plate money, and there they were initially sorted and the remainder of the conservation work was performed. Pursuant to our arrangement, the 500 best pieces of plate recov-
ered from the Nicobar were put up for public auction (Ponterio \& Associates Sale \#39, January 1990). The auction was well attended by many Scandinavian numismatists, including Bertel Tingstrom, author of "Plate Money - The World's Largest Currency". The remaining 2,000+ plates were slowly sold over a period of years, via auction or private treaty. My mother once dropped a 4 Daler plate on her foot in our camera room, resulting in her toenail coming off. The plate was later bought by Swedish numismatist Peter Osterlund, who had been told the story at lot viewing. His amusing comment was: "We always joke about this in Sweden, but I've never met anyone it's actually happened to." After the initial auction of plate money, our office halls were lined with wooden crates filled with plates, until they were finally all sold about a decade ago.

# An Introduction to The Stanley Aberdeen Collection of Swedish Plate Money 

By Kent Ponterio

The Stanley Aberdeen Collection was assembled over the past two decades by a studious Southern California collector. Although a lifelong numismatist, his interest in Swedish plate money arose later in the 1990s, as a result of the Nicobar salvage. His curiosity was piqued by the large unconventional copper plates that were used as money in Sweden in the 17th and 18th centuries. At first, a few sea-salvaged plates were acquired as a curiosity from Ponterio \& Associates auctions in the 1990s. Gradually interest expanded as his understanding of the coinage and its history grew.

The supply of plate money is fairly limited in the United States. Normally a major auction might contain a few pieces, predominantly of more common types. After realizing this, Mr. Aberdeen began bidding in Scandinavian auctions, and in this way acquired most of the rarer pieces in the collec-
tion. Using Peter Osterlund as his agent in Scandinavia, he was able to secure some fairly rare examples, including the extremely rare siege of Wismar 8 Schilling of 1715 produced in cannon metal and several other rarities. One particular plate he was justifiably proud of was the 17162 Daler struck in cannon metal, a plate he also acquired through Peter Osterlund. Often he would bring newly purchased plates to coin shows to share the joy of his newest acquisitions with other enthusiasts. The first time I ever saw a piece of plate money made of cannon metal was at one such show. A childlike joy was always present when he would walk up to a table with the newest addition to his collection. It is our hope that this joy is transferred to the new owners of Mr. Aberdeen's plate money, and that they enjoy collecting them as much as he did.

## Karl X Gustav (reigned 1654-1660)

Karl X Gustav (reigned 1654-1660). Son of John Casimir and Catherine (eldest daughter of King Charles IX) he was born on November 8, 1622. He received his civil education in the Royal Court, alongside his cousin, the future Queen Christina. He was sent in 1642 to learn the art of war in Germany, and was present with Lennart Torstenson at the Battle of Breitenfeld (1642) and Jankowitz (1645), during the Thirty Years War. Upon his return to Sweden in 1646, he unsuccessfully tried to marry Christina, then Queen-regnant. Although she rejected his proposal, his position was secured when she named him her successor (1649), and placed him in command of the Swedish forces in Germany (1648). His commission as commander came too late for him to win military success, but it gave him a place at the negotiating table discussing the treaties of Westphalia as Sweden's plenipotentiary at the Congress of Nuremburg. Karl went into a self-imposed and temporary exile upon his return to Sweden, as Queen Christina's popularity was waning. To protect his position as heir, he resided on the island of Oland until her abdication on June 5, 1654.

Early on in his reign, Karl X Gustav worked to gain support for his rule, to repair the domestic economic situation (which was left in poor condition under Christina's reign)

and to advance the new policy of Swedish conquest. To this end, he gained the support of Duke Frederick III of HolsteinGottorp (who would be a key ally in his war with Denmark), when on October 24, 1654, he married the duke's daughter Hedwig Eleonora. The following year, Sweden went to war with the Commonwealth of Poland and Lithuania, in what was to be known as the Second (or Little) Northern War. The war was fought in part to protect Karl X Gustav from a Polish claim on the Swedish throne and to secure control of the Baltic. Early on, the campaign was successful, resulting in the Polish Royal Army surrendering Krakow after a prolonged siege, and the defection of many Polish nobles to the Swedish side. However, the tide turned when Russia, the Holy Roman Empire, and Denmark rallied to support the Polish King, John II Casimir. With the situation on this front stalled, Karl X Gustav invaded Denmark in 1657. At first his army was successful in conquering the territory of Jutland, but his forces were again pushed back, this time by a Danish-Dutch alliance. After he failed to gain British or French support for unifying Denmark with the rest of Scandinavia, a parliament was called to order to evaluate the military situation. While this was convened Karl X Gustav fell ill, and on February 13, 1660, he passed away, leaving Karl XI as King-regent.

## Karl XI (reigned 1660-1697)

Karl XI (reigned 1660-1697). Karl XI was the only son of Karl X Gustav and Hedwig Eleonora, and was born on November 24, 1655. When Karl X Gustav died, the five-year old Karl XI became regent under his mother, with whom he shared power until he was old enough to rule on his own, with his coronation taking place on December 18, 1672. Athletic and a good hunter, he was not the statesman that his father had been, and relied on his mother and ministers to assist in governing, especially in foreign policy. These advisors blocked enforcement of the repossession of alienated crown lands. At the request of King Louis XIV, Sweden was drawn into another war with the Dutch in which Karl XI assumed control of the military. After his forces were turned back, the Danes attacked in an attempt to regain territory lost in the previous conflict. The Swedish army was victorious and the war was concluded in 1679 with the treaty of Lund.

The Swedes and the Danes then became further aligned against Dutch shipping interests in the Baltic, an alliance formally sealed when Karl XI married Ulrika Eleonora, sister of King Christian V of Denmark. Further treaties signed in 1678-79 at the conclusion of the Dutch war allowed Sweden to retain most of her German possessions. Starting in 1680, Karl and his advisors began to reclaim alienated crown land, increasing these holdings from less than $1 \%$ to more than $30 \%$ in Sweden and Finland. Toward the end of his reign, Karl and his advisors realized that it was in Sweden's best interest to have a balance of power between France, the Holy Roman Empire, the Netherlands and England. To this end, Sweden entered into alliances to protect her interests, and during the War of the Grand Alliance, Sweden stayed neutral. By supporting the duke of Holstein-Gottorp in Schleswig-Holstein, Karl XI secured his dynastic ties, but almost provoked a war with Denmark. He died on April 5, 1697.

## Karl XII (REIGNED 1697-1718)

Karl XII (reigned 1697-1718). The second child and eldest (and only surviving) son of Karl XI and Ulrika Eleonora, Karl XII was born on June 17, 1682. His mother died in 1693, which brought father and son together, and they developed a very close relationship, traveling together during various official trips. After his father passed away, Karl XII became the first (and only) monarch to be born into absolutism. While Karl XI had expected his 15 year old son to have a regency when he took up the throne, the regents wished to gain his support in all things, and so they declared him of age in December 1697. His upbringing had prepared him well for the task of ruling Sweden. Strong in will and in physique, he was a risk taker, which caused worry among the more cautious in his circle. He was very much influenced by the instructions left him by his late father as well as the good number of advisors he retained from his father's reign.

Karl XII's reign is notable, most of all for the Great Northern War initiated against Sweden by Denmark-Norway, Sax-
 ony and Russia. Though the young Karl XII was able to repel Denmark-Norway and Saxony-Poland-Lithuania in the first six years, his foray into Russian territory would prove unsuccessful. The Swedish Army was dismembered and Karl XII fled to the Ottoman Empire where he recuperated in exile for several years. Returning to the war, he resolved to defeat the Triple Alliance piecemeal, leaving the strongest of the three, Russia, for last. His attempts failed, and he was never able to regain the territory once held by the Swedish Empire, though Sweden itself was never taken. With the end of the Great Northern War, Russia entered the stage as a new power in Europe, while Sweden lost its Empire. As he was occupied with the 21-year conflict for over half of his life, Karl XII was unable to settle down or father an heir.

# EXTREMELY RARE Siege of Wismar Cannon Metal Plate Money From The Last Swedish Stronghold in Germany 



Wismar. 8 Schilling Plate Money, 1715. Karl XII (1697-1718). $3.25 \times 3.25$ in. KM-119 (under Germany); BT-E; Hauer-1019. EXTREMELY RARE necessity coinage plate made from gun metal at the siege of Wismar during the Great Northern War (1700-21). Wismar was a Swedish possession along the Baltic coast of Germany, having been obtained through the Treaty of Westphalia in 1648. During the Great Northern War it was besieged by a coalition of Danish, Norwegian, Russian, Saxon, Brandenburg-Prussian and Hanoverian troops. Having withstood siege for four years the city finally fell in 1716 being the last remaining outpost of Sweden's Baltic possessions. In autumn of 1715 a severe coinage shortage presented the Swedish garrison with logistical problems, as they lacked the ability to pay troops. To resolve this a decision was made to countermark circulating silver coinage, raising their worth to twice face value. At the same time it was decided to melt down cannons for the production of plate money. The production of said plate money was found to be difficult as it could not be manufactured with the same methods as traditional plate money. Due to the hardness of the metal (similar to the Stockholm cannon money of 1714-1716), blanks could not be made by hammering the metal into sheets. Instead the molten metal had to be poured directly into sheets, hence the crude fabric of these plates. Traditionally blanks were then cut from larger sheets of metal. It is clear that the besieged Swedish forces did not have the proper machinery for sheering planchets, as the edges of these pieces show a series of file or saw marks. Therefore blanks were cut from the cast sheets with some form of saw. Rather than using dies to emboss the banks, these impression were made using single character punches to create the incuse numerals for the date, denomination and inscription. A small cartouche at the top with the letters "NW" for Necessitas Wismariensis was applied above the central circle, which is the same punch used for countermarking silver coinage during the siege. Quite distinct from other plate money of the time, the surfaces are far more rough than the pure copper plates being produced in Sweden at this time. It is reported that during the siege, 1,260 pieces of plate money were produced in six different denominations. However, upon the surrender of the Swedish garrison in April of 1716 most of these plates were collected and destroyed. It is estimated that approximately 60 pieces total are know from all 6 denominations. Of this denomination, only a handful of examples (8-10) are believed to be known, some of which are in museum collections. A true rarity with a remarkable provenance. EXTREMELY FINE.

In December of 1709 the Privy Council discussed the situation of the hostile attacks on Sweden by the King of Denmark, and the effect it had on their ability to sell copper. The coinage act of December 3rd 1709 stated that plate money should be struck to alleviate the shortage of circulating money caused by foreign restrictions. During a brief period in 1714-1716, the Swedish government arranged for the melting of rejected cannons from the arsenals in Stockholm and Karlskrona to be made into coin. Unlike conventional plate money where the blanks were hammered flat, the cannon metal was of a different alloy and much to harder to be formed with this process. Therefore the copper had to be cast directly into sheets from which blanks were cut. For this reason the surfaces of these plates are much cruder than conventional plate money. Smaller diameter stamps were also applied as they required less pressure to emboss on such a hard metal. Tingstrom states that because of the metallic composition, they could hardly be used as anything but a coin, especially in the case of a private person. Their general acceptance would not have extended far beyond the boarders of Sweden, as abroad their intrinsic value would have been half to two-thirds the value of conventional copper plate money. Stamps lightly applied as usual for this type, date in center stamp is faint but discernible, corner stamps are present and full but with varying degrees of sharpness. ## Ulrika Elonora (reigned 1718-1720)

Ulrika Elonora (reigned 1718-1720). She was the younger sister of Karl XII, daughter of Karl XI and Ulrika Eleonora, born on January 23, 1688. After their sister, Hedwig Sofia died in 1708, Ulrika became heir to the throne, as Karl XII never married. In 1715, she married Duke Frederick of Hes-sen-Kassel, and upon the death of her older brother in 1718, she ascended to the throne. Although successful in a brief power struggle against her nephew, Charles Frederick

of Holstein-Gottorp, she and her husband became influenced by anti-absolutist forces in the Parliament. She became queen, but most of the power was held by the parliament, ushering in the "Age of Freedom." Allowing her devotion to her husband to overpower her ambition to rule, she abdicated in 1720, and her husband became King Fredrik I.

## Fredrik I (reigned 1720-1751)

Fredrik I (reigned 1720-1751). Born in Hessen-Kassel on April 17, 1676, Fredrik was the eldest surviving son of the landgrave of Hesse-Kassel. Before he married into the Swedish court in 1715 with his marriage to then Princess Ulrika Eleonora, he fought with distinction on the side of the English during the War of Spanish Succession (1701-14) and was married to Louise of Prussia from 1700 until her death in 1705. Although he proposed marriage to Ulrika in 1708, they were not wed until 1715 . She

abdicated to him in 1720, and continued the "Age of Freedom" until the end of his reign in 1751 when he died on March 25. He was virtually powerless as a ruler, with the authority held by the Parliament (the nobles having regained much authority while Sweden was at war with Russia), and he spent most of his time on recreational activities, including hunting and fathering several children with his mistress, although he did not have any legitimate heir with his wife.

## Adolf Fredrik, (reigned 1751-1771)

Adolf Fredrik, (reigned 1751-1771). Born into German nobility on May 14, 1710, in Schleswig-Gottorp, Adolf Fredrik was the son of Duke Christian Augustus of Schleswig-Holstein-Gottorp. He served in various capacities in the German noble ranks, including serving as Bishop of Lubeck from 1727 to 1750 . He was elected as the heir to the throne of Sweden by the "Hat Faction," and this election was supported by Czarina Elizabeth, who threatened to invade and take over portions of eastern Sweden and Finland. He succeeded as King when Fredrik I passed.


As before his succession, most of the power in Sweden remained with the Riksdag, or parliament. Twice he tried to liberate himself from their control. In 1756, assisted by Queen Louisa Ulrika (sister of the king of Prussia), he tried to overthrow parliament, but was unsuccessful, nearly losing his throne. A dozen years later, his second attempt, aided by his son, Crown Prince Gustav, brought about the overthrow of the "Cap" party, which was generally proRussian and pro-Prussian. The victorious faction of the Riksdag however, did not follow through on their promise to increase the power and authority of the king. Adolf Fredrik died on February 12, 1771 in Stockholm.

This is of course just one theory, and there are a myriad of other possibilities which would lead to this puzzling plate. Will surely be a source of interest to any who studies it. The content, though cerebral, contains important correspondences during this period of Bank of England contract negotiations and trials with firms to better the security of the "Pound Note" known and used worldwide and through their Empire. Here, hopefully furthering Perkins and Fairman's aims towards to it and the lucrative Bank of England contract work. Plate 1 and 2: Opposite, identical, double plate with medallion profile female portrait, titled "PERKINS, FAIRMAN \& HEATH/SIDEROGRAPHIA". Top vignette as used on FDU and British private notes. Britannia oval dies, lathe and ancient frieze (dies of course similar to those used in other titles' plates). There are six plates relating to the mechanical transactions. Extremely important content on all fronts. The bank note siderographic presentation directly relates to the Society of Arts, Perkins, Fairman and Heath and to the prior volumes. The other mechanical essays are of great importance as well and the genius Jacob Perkins gathered several prestigious medals, silver and gold for his work. This final Perkins volume completes a quartet that very much ties together as a suite of primary source material from the 1819-1820 siderographic technology presentations in London at that time. According to the consignor, this is the only such example known with the complete transactions of Perkin's presentations to the Society of Arts and bound together. It is impressive to behold. A unique and extremely important volume, presented to its fullest advantage with superb binding, presentation and custom solander box. Magnificent is clearly accurate, both aesthetically and historically.

Hartley, Tenterden Street, Bury, Lancashire". Very Fine copy with some expert archival restoration. New end papers front and back. Some scattered soiling on some pages near the back. A charming book and rather underrated in our view. The concentric geometric dies displayed exhibit great technological achievement. The color plate is visually stunning. Ibbetson missed the boat and was too late to be in consideration during the Society of Arts presentations and subsequent findings. He of course was disappointed. Once again, very charming visually and with multiple Kolbe pedigrees. Resided in the library of astute North Carolina currency scholar J. Roy Pennell (he wrote the North Carolina book) at a cost of $\$ 325.00$ in 1984. Later sold in 1996 Henry Morris sale by George F. Kolbe (at $\$ 770.00$ ), and in his June 2005 Craig \& Smith Library, lot 25. The only other example traced was in the Champa library, but with fewer plates. There are also four concentric circular elements on separate slips, apparently once pinned into the top of the title page of this book; these now smartly slipped into a square recessed compartment within the solander box. Well illustrated throughout with concentric patterns, circles and other geometric forms. Internally quite fine, mostly petty impairments or slightly skewed pages as originally bound. Very much superior content to a cited example owned by J. Roy Pennell and sold by Kolbe in 1996. However, he also points out that bank notes are created by the states (actually banks within states) and counterfeiters actually create notes more often than counterfeit (that is "spurious") notes. This is an interesting, independent early printing. The presentation was gradually expanded and published in book form with plates. This is a rare extract and important Bradbury historical item

Stack's Bowers is not responsible for the grades assigned by independent grading services, and makes no warranty or representation regarding such grades. Bidder further acknowledges and agrees that grades assigned by Stack's Bowers and lot descriptions are based solely upon an examination of the coins and currency and are intended to identify coins and currency and note any perceived characteristics. Any person submitting bids on behalf of a corporation or other entity, by making such bid, agrees to be personally jointly and severally liable for the payment of the purchase price and any related charges and the performance of all Buyer obligations under these Terms of Sale and Stack's Bowers reserves the right to require a written guarantee of such payments and obligations. In the event any applicable conditions of these Terms of Sale herein are not complied with by a Buyer or if the Buyer fails to make payment in full by the Default Date, Stack's Bowers reserves the right, in its sole discretion, in addition to all other remedies which it may have at law or in equity to rescind the sale of that lot or any other lot or lots sold to the defaulting Buyer, retaining all payments made by Buyer as liquidated damages, it being recognized that actual damages may be speculative or difficult to compute, and resell a portion or all of the lots held by Stack's Bowers, in a commercially reasonable manner, which may include a public or private sale, in a quantity sufficient in the opinion of Stack's Bowers to satisfy the indebtedness, plus all accrued charges, and Stack's Bowers may charge a seller's commission that is commercially reasonable. More than one such sale may take place at the option of Stack's Bowers. If Stack's Bowers resells the lots, Buyer agrees to pay for the reasonable cost of such sale, together with any incidental costs of sale, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs, cataloging and any other reasonable charges. Notice of the sale shall be by U.S.P.S. Certified Mail, Return Receipt Requested to the address utilized on the Bid Sheet, Auction Consignment and Security Agreement or other last known address by Stack's Bowers. In addition, defaulting Buyers will be deemed to have granted to Stack's Bowers, its affiliates and assignees, a security interest in: ( x ) the purchased lots and their proceeds, and ( y ) such sums or other items and their proceeds, in the possession of Stack's Bowers, its affiliates or assignees, to secure all indebtedness due to Stack's Bowers and its affiliated companies, plus all accrued expenses, carrying charges, seller's fees, attorney fees, and costs, until the indebtedness is paid in full. Buyer grants Stack's Bowers the right to file a UCC-1 financing statement for such items, and to
assign such interest to any affiliated or related company or any third party deemed appropriate by Stack's Bowers. If the auction invoice is not paid for in full by the Default Date, a carrying charge of one-and-one-half percent ( $1-1 / 2 \%$ ) per month may be imposed on the unpaid amount until it is paid in full. In the event this interest rate exceeds the interest permitted by law, the same shall be adjusted to the maximum rate permitted by law, and any amount paid in excess thereof shall be allocated to principal. NO WARRANTY, WHETHER EXPRESSED OR IMPLIED, IS MADE WITH RESPECT TO ANY LOT EXCEPT FOR WARRANTY OF TITLE, AND IN THE CASE OF TITLE, AUCTIONEER IS SELLING ONLY THAT RIGHT OR TITLE TO THE LOT THAT THE CONSIGNOR MAY HAVE AS OF THE AUCTION SALE DATE. ALL LOTS ARE SOLD "AS IS" AND WITH ALL FAULTS. PURCHASER HEREBY AS SUMES ALL RISKS CONCERNING AND RELATED TO THE GRADING, QUALITY, DESCRIPTION, CONDITION, AUTHENTICITY, AND PROVENANCE OF A LOT.

f. Questions regarding the minting of a coin as a "proof" or as a "business strike" relate to the method of manufacture and not to authenticity.
g. All oral and written statements made by Stack's Bowers and its employees or agents (including affiliated and related companies) are statements of opinion only, and are not warranties or representations of any kind, unless stated as a specific written warranty, and no employee or agent of Stack's Bowers has authority to vary or alter these Terms and Conditions of Auction Sale. Stack's Bowers reserves the right to vary or alter the Terms of Sale, either generally or with respect to specific persons or circumstances, in its sole discretion. 11. Waiver and Release. Bidder, for himself, his heirs, agents, successors and assignees, generally and specifically waives and releases, and forever discharges Stack's Bowers, and its respective affiliates, parents, officers, directors, shareholders, agents, subsidiaries, employees, managers and members and each of them, and their respective successors and assignees from any and all claims, rights, demands and causes of actions and suits, of whatever kind or nature, including but not limited to claims based upon Auctioneer's negligence, whether in law or equity, tort or otherwise, whether known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected (a "Claim"), which Bidder may assert with respect to and/or arising out of, or in connection with any challenge to the title to or authenticity of any goods purchased, the sale itself, any lot bid upon or consigned, and/or the auction, except where such Claim is otherwise expressly authorized in these Terms of Sale. 12. Disputes. If a dispute arises concerning ownership of a lot or concerning proceeds of any sale, Stack's Bowers reserves the right to commence a statutory interpleader proceeding at the expense of the Consignor and Buyer and any other applicable party, and in such event shall be entitled to its reasonable attorneys' fees and costs. Stack's Bowers reserves the right to cancel or postpone the Auction Sale or any session thereof for any reason whatsoever. No Bidder shall have any claim as a result thereof, including for incidental or consequential damages. Neither Stack's Bowers nor any affiliated or related company shall be responsible for incidental or consequential damages arising out of any failure of the Terms of Sale, the auction or the conduct thereof and in no event shall such liability exceed the purchase price, premium, or fees paid. The award by the arbitrator, if any, may be entered in any court having jurisdiction thereof. Each party shall pay one-half the costs of the arbitration. Bidder acknowledges and agrees that the competent courts of the State of California shall have exclusive in personam jurisdiction, subject to the requirement to arbitrate, over any dispute(s) arising hereunder, regardless of any party's current or future residence or domicile. Bidder further agrees that venue of the arbitration proceeding shall be in Orange County, California; and any court proceeding shall be in the Orange County Superior Court, in the State of California, and in each case waive any claim of Forum Non Conveniens. Bidder agrees that any arbitration or legal action with respect to this Auction Sale is barred unless commenced within one (1) year of the date of this Auction Sale. AUCTION PARTICIPANTS EXPRESSLY WAIVE ANY RIGHT TO TRIAL BY JURY.
13. General Terms.
