

# The Massachusetts Historical Society's Coin Collection

Over the last century and a half the Massachusetts Historical Society acquired a considerable collection of coins. The first coins were occasional gifts by interested members or friends of history; later came substantial bequests of coin collections, such as that of William Sumner Appleton, and also occasional purchases to round out collections. The last major acquisition was the Adams family collection in the early 20th century.

Owing to changing methods in historical research and the increasing specialization of the Society's activities in the field of historical manuscripts, the Society's coins have been very little used by scholars in recent decades. Nor does the Society have facilities for showing them to the general public. In 1965 the danger of theft became so apparent that the collection was placed in the vaults of a Boston bank. What had previously been a great difficulty in showing the coins to occasional interested persons became almost an impossibility. The coins which had become of diminishing use for the purposes of history became of no use at all. The choice appeared to be to keep them in dead storage indefinitely or to expose them to the probable danger of theft.

Fortunately a better solution was proposed. The Probate Court was petitioned for permission to deposit the important American coins with the one institution in Boston which already had a similar collection and which has excellent facilities to preserve, show, and protect the coins. The Court also granted permission to sell for the benefit of the Society duplicates and foreign coins without special interest to students of American history. With this end in view, the services of Stack's were engaged for the disposal of such coins.

#### U. S. COLONIAL COINS

The Colonial coins, and early State coins issued during the period of the Confederation, listed below, are being offered on behalf of the Massachusetts Historical Society. They originally formed part of the Appleton collection of United States coins and related numismatic material bequeathed to the Society in 1905 by the late William Summer Appleton of Boston.

We are understandably excited about this collection because of its broad scope and the superb quality of most of the coins. But the splendid group of Massachusetts silver, and the many pedigreed pieces, are really the focal point of the offering.

#### MASSACHUSETTS SILVER

#### OAK TREE SERIES

- 1652 Oak Tree Shilling. Noe 3. Fine. A lovely shaped tree as on Noe 1 and 2. Very rare die variety. Reverse legend starts at 1:30 o'clock. No other Oak Tree Shilling starts at this point. Evidently struck on a short weight planchet (62 grains), since if it had been clipped the extra metal at the off-center portion would have been taken. This is the specimen mentioned by Noe as having irregular edges (A.N.S., No. 110, p. 14). Advanced state of die that Noe mentions in the same description so that right side is not struck up well at all. Very similar indeed to the Hillyer Ryder, Boyd specimen sold by New Netherlands in their 59th Sale, June 1967, Lot 1030 at \$400.00. PLATE
- 2 **1652 Oak Tree Shilling. Noe 3.** Good. A duplicate, and clipped down to about the weight of a Sixpence (36½ grains). Evidently one of the four that Noe mentions as having a cleft flan (see reference above). An earlier state of the dies since despite the clipping, the portion at 3 o'clock is struck up.
- 3 **1652 Oak Tree Shilling. Noe 4.** Very Fine. Full, though somewhat irregularly shaped planchet. Nice broad tree which makes this variety so popular with type collectors. A few minor digs or more probably teething marks, which are not unusual to find in this series. A scarce variety and quite a nice type coin.





Lot No. 4

- 4 **1652 Oak Tree Shilling. Noe 5.** Very Fine. Full planchet, slightly off-center and somewhat weakly struck at 9 o'clock on obverse and corresponding portion of reverse, not substantially affecting the legend. A lovely full tree with the shrubs at sides sharp. Though a common variety, it is difficult to find so nice, and is highly sought-after by type collectors. **PLATE**
- 5 **1652 Oak Tree Shilling. Noe 14.** Fine. Well rounded planchet. A different style tree, with many spines on the branches, hence dubbed "**The Spiny Tree.**" Shrubs emanating from the base of the tree. Complete tree, date, and denomination, making this another excellent type coin. **PLATE**
- 6 **1652 Oak Tree Shilling. Noe 14.** Good. A duplicate. Late state of dies, the obverse being bulged making part of the tree indistinct. Still an acceptable type coin.
- 7 **1652 Oak Tree Sixpence. Noe 16.** Very Fine. Bottom of tree weak as are all of this variety from the later state of the dies. Left side of obverse legend not struck up. Reverse is very well struck up and very sharp. Tiny paper tag with the letter "F" glued in the field (removable) to designate Reverse F of Crosby's listing. A common but very cestrable piece.





Lot No. 8

Oak Tree Sixpence. Noe 17. Very Fine. A tree unlike any of the other Oak Tree pieces. The trunk broad and tall with odd shaped roots and branches. The die relations for obverse and reverse are sideways, which only occurs in this variety and Noe 18 which follows. The date is very high. It appears to be clipped at 9 o'clock removing "AS" of the legend, but since it is almost full weight (35 grains) it is more logical to assume that the coin was produced this way. A very rare variety as well as a very distinctive type. Perhaps about a half dozen specimens known, if that many. Lacking in most collections including the superb collection in the American Numismatic Society. A prize for the specialist and the type collector. PLATE

- 9 1652 Oak Tree Sixpence. Noe 18. Good. Another excessively rare variety. The dies of Noe 17 (above) were strengthened and reworked to produce the dies of this variety. The 2 of the date appears to have been recut backwards first, so that it now resembles a zero with a base line. The dies have the same sidewise alignment. Crosby notes (Page 53 Variety 2) "A variety rarely found and all very poor specimens." Noe also mentions (P. 19 Var. 18) "All specimens examined are poorly preserved." The important central portions of obverse and reverse of this coin are well struck up. The legends are weak in several areas. Unfortunately the coin has light cross scratches on the obverse and reverse. A tiny removable paper tag affixed to the reverse mistakenly designates it as Crosby Reverse "C." It is actually Crosby's Reverse B. This variety was lacking in the extensive New Netherland's offering of the combination of Dr. Black, F. C. C. Boyd, and Maj. A Walter estates as well as a Continental Consignor and other sources in their December 1968 60th Sale. It was also lacking in the Stearns (1966) Sale. As is the case with the Noe 17 above, this is also lacking in most major collections, notably the American Numismatic Society. Another exceptional opportunity for the specialist and type collector. PLATE
- 10 1652 Oak Tree Sixpence. Noe 20. Very Good. A very rare variety again. Lacking in the New Netherlands sale mentioned above. Two holed specimens only in the Steams offering. The obverse is off-center as are the other known specimens, the reverse perfectly centered. Unfortunately the obverse is marred by numerous scratches and the reverse by a few. The first "S" is weak and all but lacking, but the beads at that point and the centering make this variety unmistakable. Not a pretty looking coin but an important one.
- 11 1652 Oak Tree Sixpence. Noe 21. Very Fine. Made from the same dies as Noe 20 above, but in strengthening the letters the first "S" was mistakenly reversed. Weakly struck at 9 o'clock so that the "A" and top part of the reversed "S" do not show. But the important reversed bottom is sharp and clear. The tree is very sharp as well as the balance of the legend. The reverse well struck and both sides well centered. The planchet is somewhat irregular. Not a rare variety but a highly desirable coin. This same reverse die was later used on the very rare "Spiny Tree" Pine Tree Sixpence (Noe 32). PLATE
- 12 1652 Oak Tree Sixpence. Noe 21. A duplicate. Very Fine. Much better struck, showing full "MA & reversed S." Struck over a cut down Noe 14 Oak Tree Shilling. This is the fourth such overstriking known to us, two being in the private collection of William J. Wild. Very well struck and well centered with tree and all lettering sharp and clear. Unfortunately marred by a small hole in the field at about 4 o'clock. However, this damage can be considered unimportant on such an otherwise lovely looking coin and on such a rare and important overstrike. PLATE
- 13 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 23. Very Fine. Another rare variety and the only Massachusetts Silver piece to have all S's reversed. This does not occur on any other Willow, Oak or Pine Tree coin of any denomination. Very well struck so that the tree and entire legend are in full sharp relief, as are the legend, date, and denomination on the reverse. An exceptional coin for this rare variety and very distinctive type. PLATE


14 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 23. Very Fine. A duplicate. Though on a nicer planchet than the above, this coin is not as sharp, and a later state of the dies. The legend is weak from about 6 o'clock to about 10 o'clock obliterating most of those letters. The reverse, however, is very sharp and very well struck up, and is more attractive than Lot 13, though the inner circle of beads is weak in some areas. Another highly desirable coin. It is most unusual to find two such excellent specimens of such a rare variety in the same sale. PLATE





Lot No. 15

- 15 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 25. Very Fine. From the same dies as Noe 23 but with all of the reversed S's now in their proper form. This rare variety was lacking in the extensive New Netherlands and Stearns offerings mentioned previously. Parts of the legend are weakly struck on the obverse but the reverse legend is very sharp and well struck, being weak only at the tops of "EW." Struck on a slightly broader planchet than the Noe illustration and weighing slightly more (17 grains). Not much has been made of the rarity of this variety simply because it is of the normal type and has seldom appeared for sale. We expect, however, this elusive item to register considerable competition. PLATE
- 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 25. A duplicate. Poor. A very difficult coin to properly describe since it was bent and straightened in two places and has a tiny hole under the right arm of the second "T." The tree had been well struck as had been the legends, but it suffers a good deal from the effects of the bending and straightening. In addition to the rarity of the die variety, the appeal of this early "witch piece" should make it particularly attractive. For a discussion of these witch pieces see Noe's Monograph on the Pine Tree coinage (A.N.S., No. 125, p. 19). PLATE
- 17 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 26. Very Fine. Another rarity not offered in the New Netherlands 60th Sale or Stearns Sale. Noe states "This is possibly a recutting of No. 25 although the preservation of the specimens available for study did not permit certainty." It seems that he was only able to find THREE specimens to study. After comparing this specimen with Noe 25 (Lot 15 above), there is no question that Noe's suspicion was correct. There are some weaknesses in striking or perhaps in the die itself that are the same as the coin illustrated in Noe. Otherwise a very well struck and well preserved specimen of this rarity. PLATE
- 18 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 27. Extremely Fine. Though a common variety, this specimen is in uncommonly nice condition despite the fact that there was one bend that has been straightened. Fortunately this does not impair the appearance of this lovely, partially blue toned specimen. The few minor weaknesses in the legend are characteristic of the die as can be seen by comparison with the Noe plate. The tree, date, and denomination are in needle-point sharpness. A prize for the type collector as all Oak Tree Three-pences are rare, and especially so this nice. PLATE



- 19 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 27/26. Fine. This is an extremely rare transitional piece, having the obverse of Noe 27 and the reverse of Noe 26, with partial recutting. Two other specimens known. Lot 9 of our Charles Jay Sale, Oct. 27, 28, 1967, and Lot 204 of New Netherlands 60th Sale, Dec. 3, 4, 1968. This specimen has weaknesses in the legend in approximately the same places as the discovery piece. The few minor digs and some old encrustation do not detract from the importance of this excessively rare coin. PLATE
- 20 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 28. Fine. The early die state of this rare variety, and the only state described by Noe. Well struck with full tree, date, and denomination. The tree especially sharp, more so than the Noe plate coin. A small piece is broken off the planchet (as made?) over the letters of "AS," not interfering with those letters, but taking off the very top of the A on the reverse opposite. Also a curious rolling of the planchet (as made?) over HV. Over-all a very nice piece, and worthy of a spot in any cabinet. PLATE
- 21 **1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 28.** Very Good. A duplicate of the early die state. The tree somewhat flat as in the Noe illustration. Some portions of the legend weak and indiscernible. Still a scarce piece and a very worthwhile type coin.
- 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 28. Very Good. Later die state. This die state was described by Wurtzbach as being unique and he called it his 33-A. The weaknesses in the legend are the same as exhibited on his specimen. The die break over N and into A appears to be farther advanced than on his specimen having an additional break from the left top of A to rim. The first break curiously enough crosses both legs of A and appears to be an additional crossbar. A very well struck coin with a slight bend. Unfortunately a deep scratch enters the tree from the rim at about 7o'clock. A very important coin. PLATE
- 23 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 28. Very Fine. Very late die state hitherto unrecorded and unpublished. The die break from N to A is much heavier and the new break from the left side of A to the rim has developed into a massive triangular lump. The obverse is weakly struck and off-center so that a number of the letters of the obverse legend do not show up. However, the all important reverse is well centered and sharply struck so that all of the details of this new discovery are sharp and clear. Of the utmost importance to all students of this series. PLATE
- 24 1652 Oak Tree Threepence. Noe 28. Good. A duplicate of the late state. Unfortunately struck on a smaller planchet so that the top part of the A is not in evidence. It is difficult to say whether this is the latest state or the Wurtzbach 33-A. In other respects the reverse is well centered and well struck, and the break across A forming the second crossbar is sharp and clear. The obverse is slightly off-center but a few digs and honest wear mar the sharpness of the tree as well as several letters of the legend.

- 1662 Oak Tree Twopence. Noe 30. Extremely Fine. The only coin to depart from the 1652 dating in the entire Silver Tree coinage of Massachusetts. Though Noe describes six distinct recuttings of this die, and a number of intermediate states have been discovered since, we find that there are only two distinct styles. The first style (Noe 29, 30, and 31) has small numerals in the date, most noticeably the 2. The second style (Noe 32, 33, and 34) as the result of several recuttings, has the numerals enlarged with the 2 much larger and of more conventional shape. It has been our experience that the first style is somewhat scarcer than the second. This specimen (Style I) is an excellent one, being well centered on both sides, and sharply struck in all portions. It compares very favorably with the Noe plate coin except for a few short very light scratches on the reverse. Considerably heavier than any of the six different varieties that Noe illustrated 13 grains. PLATE
- 26 **1662 Oak Tree Twopence. Noe 31.** Fine. Struck off-center on the obverse so that parts of that legend are off the flan. The tree is full and well struck with just some honest wear. The reverse is well struck and well centered but parts of the legend weak, again from honest wear. The last of the Style I pieces and a very nice type coin. **PLATE**





Lot No. 27

- 27 1662 Oak Tree Twopence. Noe 33. THE NOE PLATE SPECIMEN (PLATE VIII No. 33). Extremely Fine. Style 2 with larger numerals and recut 2. Perfectly centered obverse and reverse, and very sharp strike. The minor weakness over SET and the corresponding portion on the reverse is due to die failure. It was evidently the best specimen that Noe could find to illustrate this die state. A truly magnificent little coin as well as an historical one. PLATE
- 28 **1662 Oak Tree Twopence.** Fair-Good. This specimen is too worn to determine exactly which die state it is, though it appears to be either 33 or 34. In addition to wear, it has been holed and evidently worn as a witch piece. Despite its disadvantagen it's still an Oak Tree Twopence and a good representation of one of the earliest coins to be struck in this country.

#### PINE TREE SERIES

29 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 1. Very Fine. A very unusual coin in that it was struck over another Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 1. The letters LAND. A from the reverse of the first striking are clearly visible under the tree. The VSE of the obverse of the first striking can also be seen after DO in the reverse inscription. This is the first instance of such an overstriking that has come to our attention. Though the coin is on a full planchet and of full weight, and has evidently seen only little wear, it shows the effect of several teeth marks. It is the very early die state, showing no indications of the breaks of the later states. PLATE

- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 5. Extremely Fine. A lovely naturally dark toned coin on a full round planchet and perfectly centered. It has evidently seen very little wear judging from its weight of 72.5 grains as compared to the Noe plate coin which weighs only 69.2 grains. A very sharp strike for this shallow cut die. The slight bend at about 4 o'clock is of only minor importance. Another remarkable coin. PLATE
- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 7. Extremely Fine. Another rare variety and one not represented in the Stearns or New Netherlands 59th or 60th offerings. Easily distinguished by the peculiar shape of the roots. Very sharply struck on an almost round but short planchet, so that the tops of several of the letters are lacking. There are three inexplicable defects in the flan on the reverse under XII which are definitely not digs. They are most probably defects that were in the flan before the coin was struck, or the results of bits of foreign material stuck to the die. Slight weakness at the trunk and bottom branches evidently caused by a slight bend or bulge. A very elusive variety in exceptionally nice shape. PLATE






Lot No. 32

- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 8. Extremely Fine. Medium die state. Lovely and very impressive, naturally toned, very well preserved example on an almost full round planchet. The planchet is defective at about 5 o'clock which interrupts the outer beaded border. Except for that area, both inner and outer circle of beads are complete. The tree, legends, date, and denomination fully struck up. The variety with N of IN reversed on the obverse, and NE of NEW joined together as one letter or monogram on the reverse.

  The only variety to have this NE peculiarity. Not a rare variety and because of its sharp strike and excellent condition, an ideal type coin. 70 grains. PLATE
- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 8. Extremely Fine, lustrous. A duplicate but the much later die state missing the three beads under the second S as mentioned by Noe. This is caused by the heavy break opposite that area on the reverse. A split in the flan between H and V and another smaller one under the tree. The planchet has an irregularity of the same shape and nature as above. A light scratch in the field to the left of the tree. The tree is full and sharply struck, as are the date and denomination. The full weight of 71 grains indicates that it has seen very little wear. The Noe plate coin weighs only 70.1 grains. PLATE



- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 8. Very Fine. Another duplicate, but this is the very early die state, with no hint of the die break. A completely full round planchet with the full weight of 70½ grains. There is a circular punch mark in the field at about 5 o'clock just below the lowest branch of the tree and just touching the base of I of IN and encompassing 4 beads of the inner circle. A few digs on the obverse under the tree which causes some flatness opposite on the reverse. But the fullness and sharpness of the tree make up for these deficiencies, making this another nice type coin. **PLATE**
- 35 **1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 9.** Very Fine. The tree is somewhat weak, as on all specimens as explained by Noe. The planchet is irregular from about 5 o'clock to 7 o'clock, as is the Noe plate coin. There is no damage and very little wear on this 72 grain coin, where the Noe plate coin weighs only 70.2 grains. Everything well struck up. Type coins of this quality are becoming more and more difficult to find. **PLATE**
- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 9. Very Good. Duplicate. Later die state showing more weakness of the tree as well as some at the first S and across to the last T of MASATHUSETS. The planchet irregularity is at 9 o'clock. Otherwise very well struck and well centered, and of almost full weight of 69½ grains.
- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 11. Very Fine. MASATUSETS. The only variety lacking the H. This is the only instance where a letter is completely lacking in the legend. In addition all four N's are reversed. Large broad tree almost filling the entire inner circle. Slightly impaired by a few teeth marks and scratches, but still a top specimen for this very interesting and very popular variety, and again with full weight of 72 grains. PLATE





Lot No. 38

1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 13. Very Fine. The Noe Plate Specimen. Noe states, "The only specimen known to me is in the collection of the Massachusetts Historical Society." THIS IS THAT SPECIMEN. IN ADDITION, IT IS THE CROSBY PLATE COIN. BEING LISTED AS HIS 9-G ON PAGE 59 AND ILLUSTRATED AS 5, PLATE II. Though worn and clipped as described by Noe, the tree, date, and denomination are surprisingly sharp and clear. The tree is of such distinctive shape, as well as the large date and denomination, that it should have a high appeal to the type collector as well as the specialist. OF INESTIMABLE IMPORTANCE! PLATE


- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 16. Very Fine. The small planchet type, as are all the following. Beautifully round, well struck and well centered, and the tree in full sharpness as are all the letters of the legend, date, and denomination. This is the variety that has the I's of the denomination recut over previously made small I's, and the serifs of the earlier ones can easily be seen. It is a fairly early die state where the flaw in the tree is just starting. Another superb type coin. PLATE
- 40 **1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 19.** Very Fine. On a full, almost round planchet with most of the outer ring of beads showing. A lovely lustrous toned surface and a full 70 grains, where the Noe plate coin was only 64.8 grains. Sharply struck up at all points except for a slight weakness at V and on the reverse opposite. A lovely coin that would be difficult to surpass. **PLATE**
- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 22. Extremely Fine. Very rare variety and in a later state than was described by Noe. A superb specimen with the full weight of 721/4 grains compared to the 69.5 grains that the Noe specimen weighed. The flaw at AN at 6 o'clock on the reverse has developed into a massive break, obliterating those letters. The corresponding portion of the obverse shows that the rosette as well as a few beads of the inner circle are also obliterated. Very little, if any, wear with no scratches, nicks or other blemishes. In many respects, better than the Noe plate coin. A truly remarkable coin. PLATE
- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 25. Very Fine. Another rare variety, and the interesting type that shows the W formed by two distinct and separate V's. Slightly off-center with a tiny defect in the planchet causing the very top of the V on the obverse to be off the planchet. The advanced state of the die break causing weakness at 6 o'clock, obverse and reverse. The tree and everything else in full sharpness and weighing 71½ grains as compared to the Noe plate coin at 71.2 grains. PLATE
- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 25. Fine to Very Fine. A duplicate of this rare variety, better centered and sharply struck, and about the same die state, exhibiting the same weaknesses as above. A few minor light scratches on the reverse at 6 o'clock. The weight again is high at 70½ grains. PLATE
- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 26. Very Fine/Very Good. Same reverse type with the VV's. A most curious coin as well as being a rare variety. The obverse is slightly off-center, but not affecting any of the letters. The obverse is very well struck with the tree and legend in full prominence. The reverse appears to be very weakly struck. The V's stand out sharply but the G is so weak that it is barely seen. The curved portion of D and the O of DO can barely be seen. This is all evidently due to some flaw in striking and not to wear as it weighs a full 72 grains. PLATE





Lot No. 45

- 45 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 27. Fine. Excessively rare variety. Lacking in the New Netherlands and Stearns offerings. The specimen Stearns listed (Lot 115) was a mis-attributed Noe 20. Noe was able to find only two specimens to examine when preparing his Monograph. This is evidently that second piece since he had access to the Massachusetts Historical Society cabinet when he was doing his work. Wurtzbach was evidently aware of this, as in his privately printed brochure (1937) he lists this as his 55 and mentions that there are only two known. Noe used the same illustration as Wurtzbach used, the T. James Clark specimen weighing 68.1 grains. This Massachusetts Historical Society piece weighs 67.5 grains. It is lacking in the American Numismatic Society collection and we do not know of a third specimen. The tree is in full sharpness as is the entire obverse legend. The very top of the first S is off the planchet, but the last S and rosette are stronger than the Noe plate. The date and denomination of the reverse are sharp and clear but the reverse legend exhibits the same weaknesses and die failure as the plate coin. A rare opportunity to own an excessively rare and important coin. PLATE
- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 28. Very Fine. Not quite as rare as the last, but still a very rare variety. It was lacking in the Steams offering, but New Netherlands 60th sale had an inferior one that was said to be one of no more than seven known, mentioning this Massachusetts Historical Society coin as being one of them. The tree is very sharp and lacking only the tip of the topmost branch due to failure of the die which also erases the VS above. The reverse is also weak at 12 o'clock (opposite) as well as having the same weaknesses as the Noe plate coin. Its weight, 68¾ grains, is about the same as the plate coin. Another very important coin. PLATE
- 47 **1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 30.** Fair. One of the commoner varieties clipped down and well worn to a weight of about 49 grains. Though the legends are mostly worn off, the tree is full and prominent and the date and denomination legible, making it an inexpensive type coin of this earliest and most important coinage of our history.
- 1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 31. Fine. NOE PLATE COIN UNIQUE! Noe states that this is the only known specimen and was formerly in the CROSBY COLLECTION. It is very worn and clipped, as well as holed, so that it weighs only 36.4 grains. The distinctive tree is mostly strong. Of the date, the 1 is very weak, the 6 invisible, and the 52 strong. Only the II of the denomination shows. Though not an impressive looking coin, it is of the highest importance being the only known specimen and having the Crosby and Massachusetts Historical Society pedigrees. PLATE



1652 Pine Tree Sixpence. Noe 33. Very Fine. The obverse is off-center as are all of this variety (see Noe plate) so that the top letters of the obverse are off the planchet. The reverse is well centered. The coin is very sharply struck with no weaknesses at all, and compares very favorably with the Noe plate coin. The weight is somewhat better being 34½ grains where the plate coin is only 33.9 grains. The commoner of only two die varieties for this scarce denomination. An admirable addition to any cabinet. PLATE





Lot No. 50

- 50 1652 Pine Tree Threepence. Noe 34. Fine. The variety with a pellet on either side of the tree trunk. Another remarkable coin and in some respects better than the Noe plate coin. The obverse is off-center towards the top as usual, and similar to the sixpence above. The reverse is well centered and very sharp. This specimen is most important because three of the four dots after England (. · .) are clearly visible. The Noe plate coin as well as the De Witt-Smith-Brand-Wurtzbach-Clarke-Boyd specimen (New Netherlands 60th Sale, Lot 228) only showed one of these periods, and in Noe's description of the dies he only mentions one period after ENGLAND, as does the description in the New Netherlands catalog. Crosby must have seen a better one (perhaps this specimen) as he describes it as four dots (...) though even the Crosby plate coin isn't good enough to show it. The fourth lower dot can barely be seen on this coin but the other three are very sharp. The coin is well struck and everything, except as mentioned, is in full sharpness. An important discovery coin and one that will be needed to change the description in Noe. PLATE
- 1652 Pine Tree Threepence. Noe 36. Extremely Fine. A lovely specimen with slight weakness at about 9 o'clock affecting only the tops of the letters TS, and the corresponding portion of the reverse. The rare late state of the die showing the heavy rim break from the outer ring of beads between AS to the rim. The reverse shows the effect of this break in that three of the beads of the outer ring are not struck up. Everything else is sharply struck up, on a full flan and well centered. Better than any that have been offered in any of the recent sales. PLATE
- 1652 OAK TREE Shilling. Noe 1. Very Fine. The Noe Plate Coin. ILLUSTRATING THE CLIPPING PRACTICE (A.N.S., No. 125, Plate 5a). This particular coin is also discussed thoroughly on Pages 23 and 24 of the text. Though many coins have been found clipped, the majority are Pine Trees with small pieces taken off the edges. The condition of this specimen is excellent and most of the tree is on the coin. Well struck and very sharp. The reverse shows the full date and only the lower part of the denomination is cut off. PLATE

1652 Pine Tree Shilling. Noe 26. Very Fine. Another Noe Plate Coin of a similar type, illustrated on Plate 5-D of the same book and discussed on Page 24. This specimen, rather than being clipped for silver, was probably cut to pass for a lower denomination. Noe raised the possibility that it may have been bent for a witch piece and broken in the process. The fact that the obverse bears the marks of a sharp tool, however, inclines us to believe that it was cut. The right half of the base and four of the branches are on the obverse. The reverse shows the l of the date and the X of the denomination. Curiously enough, the two separate V's that make up the W are sharp and clear. PLATE

#### ROSA AMERICANA COINAGE

- 1722 Rosa Americana Halfpenny. Uncrowned Rose. About Uncirculated. A superb little coin, well centered and sharply struck, with full hair, curls, and wreath. Nicely toned with some hints of original color within the letters. PLATE
- 55 **1722 Halfpenny.** A duplicate, but of different dies. Very Fine, but the edges show dark corrosion spots affecting several letters. The obverse is a brassy color, as made, and the reverse is toned to a light tan. The reverse is about 1/10 off center. Some minor pitting in a few areas, but still a nice coin, nicer than it sounds.
- 1722 Penny. VTILE DVLCI. Uncrowned Rose. About Uncirculated. Sharply struck and perfectly centered. Full hair, curls, and wreath. Light golden, shading to dark tan obverse, with a light brown reverse. Lightly double struck, showing on most of the letters and giving George a double profile. Small corrosion spot at the E of VTILE. An excellent type coin. PLATE
- 1723 Penny, Crowned Rose. Very Fine. Well struck and well centered. Very little light even wear. Toned to a warm chocolate brown. A few soft digs on the obverse and reverse that detract very little from this pleasant looking coin, with lustrous surfaces.
- 58 **1723 Penny.** A duplicate. Fine, lighter in color with duller surfaces. Slightly more wear but with no damage. A nice clean type coin.
- 59 Undated (1722) Twopence. Uncrowned Rose. Very Fine. Well centered but weakly struck on a very porous planchet. Evidently very little wear, as can be seen by the full seeds of the rose which is the high point of the reverse. A few old light scratches under the chin. A mottled medium brown coin and very acceptable for a nice type set.
- 60 1723 Twopence. Crowned Rose. Period after REX, no period after date. Very Good. Well centered and sharply struck with even wear. Several planchet defects mostly on the obverse edge, with one running through the D into head. An even light brown color, with all seeds of the rose distinct.
- 61 1723 Twopence. Period after date, no period after REX. Very Fine. Light even wear, full head, wreath, and curls. Curious weak striking at RICANA which makes these letters indistinct and affects the tops of the letters REX on the obverse opposite. The seeds of the rose show light even wear but they are still separate and distinct. Except as mentioned, everything is in full prominence which makes for another nice type coin.



- 1785 Ryder 2. Landscape variety. Very Fine. A surprisingly well centered and well struck specimen, devoid of the usual planchet defects. One of the nicest we've seen or handled in years. Slight weakness under 85 and over A, but not enough to seriously deter from its excellence. A pleasant tan color with dark shading in the enclosed areas. Truly α prize for the Vermont or type collector. PLATE
- 1786 Ryder 9. Baby head. Very Fine. Another excellent coin. Obverse perfectly centered showing all letters and head details. The reverse is slightly off-center so that the bottom of the date is off the flan. All the letters of the legend are on the flan and sharply struck, as is the entire central figure and shield. A crack in the planchet from the rim into the point of the bust and affecting no part of the reverse design. A decidedly superior coin than the Stearns (12/2/66 Lot 158) example, which was the last nice one up for public sale and realized \$650.00 in highly contested bidding. Another Vermont prize. PLATE
- of this variety which always comes with the reverse almost completely effaced. This reverse shows about ½ of the branch and the final letters NIA, which puts it in the "well above average" class. The obverse is in the fairly late state showing the break through the bust. A clean coin with no perceptible damage and a pleasant light brown color.
- 1787 Ryder 14. Bust right. Fine. A fairly common variety and sought after as a type coin. A tiny attempted puncture at the point of bust on the obverse and two more on the reverse, but well struck on a good clean planchet, with all details sharp and clear. Evenly toned light brown color.
- 1787 Ryder 14. A duplicate. Very Good. Perfectly centered. With slightly more wear than the last but no damage. Medium to dark brown.
- 1788 Ryder 18. The rare ET LIB INDE reverse. Fine. Struck over George III Irish halfpenny. Almost all specimens seen of this variety are struck over other coins, mostly British or Irish halfpennies. Some letters of the undertype are still visible, so that the obverse inscription appears to read "VERMON GEOR TORI" and the reverse "HI ET LIB INDE." The top of the crown above the harp of the Irish halfpenny comes directly between ET LIB. Small dig above head and a light scratch on reverse. An excellent specimen of this rare variety and type showing the details of the mail in spite of the obverse die break. A nice medium brown color. PLATE



- 1788 Ryder 24. The Horned Bust, so named because of the die break starting at the bust. Very Fine A few pinpoint digs from the nose to the T. Sharply struck and perfectly centered. All details sharp and clear, including the date. Lovely glossy surfaces and toned to a light chestnut brown. A very popular type coin. PLATE
- 1788 Ryder 25. Very Good. An earlier state of the Horned Bust with a different reverse and the break smaller. Obverse slightly off-center but reverse well centered and starting to bulge. All details clear including a full date.

#### MASSACHUSETTS COPPER

- 70 1787 Half Cent. Ryder 1-D. Very Good. The scarce type with twigs in the branch.

  A dig in the center of the Indian and several edge bruises making the coin out of full round. Still a scarce type and variety. Even dark brown color.
- 71 1787 Half Cent. Ryder 4-C. Extremely Fine. The normal type and a common variety. Perfectly centered and sharply struck. Full feathers on the eagle and HALF CENT sharp and clear. A lovely dark brown color on a clean planchet with glossy surfaces. PLATE
- 72 **1787 Half Cent. Ryder 5-A.** Very Fine. Another common variety and a good type coin. Well centered and sharply struck. Full feathers on the eagle. HALF CENT weak but visible. A very pleasing even dark brown.
- 1787 Half Cent. Ryder 5-A. About Uncirculated. A duplicate, but the much scarcer, later state of the dies with rim break over U. Very slightly off-center on the obverse, sharp shorter denticles at the top and longer ones at the bottom. The reverse is better centered. A very sharp strike for this variety, with full sharpness to the feathers and strong HALF CENT. An iridescent light brown with glossy surfaces. PLATE
- 1788 Half Cent. Ryder 1-B. Very Fine. The commoner of only two varieties of this date and the only type. The early die state without the die break at the second 8. Well centered and well struck, with full feathers and HALF CENT. Nice surfaces with no blemishes and a medium brown color.
- 75 **1787 Cent. Ryder 2b-A.** Very Fine. The Horned Eagle, named for the die break out of the eagle's head. A well centered sharply struck coin. Full feathers and very sharp CENT. Light scratch across Indian's waist, plus a few other very minor handling marks. Medium brown with nice surfaces.
- 76 **1787 Cent. Ryder 3-G.** Very Good. Common variety with period-like defects before C and after W. Well centered and struck. Dig between head and W. Evenly worn, full date.
- 77 1787 Cent. Ryder 4-C. Very Fine. A scarce variety, about R. 4. Well centered and well struck, with all details sharp and clear. The Indian's face surprisingly sharp. A few very minor digs, but over-all an excellent specimen for this scarce variety. A light chestnut brown with clean surfaces.
- 78 1787 Cent. Ryder 4-D. Very Good. Not quite as scarce, perhaps R. 3. Very light planchet clip (as made) at about 1 o'clock. Evenly worn with a few light edge nicks and the planchet slightly bent.
- 79 1788 Cent. Ryder 1-D. About Uncirculated. A common variety but a superb type coin because of its condition. All details very sharp including the Indian's hair and tunic. Full shield on the reverse and sharp eagle. A lovely iridescent golden tan. PLATE

- 80 1788 Cent. Ryder 1-D. Fine. A duplicate. Small dig left of base of bow, otherwise a clean evenly worn type coin.
- 1788 Cent. Ryder 4-G. Very Good. Somewhat scarce, about R. 3, but about the most unusual coin we've seen because of the planchet which is split about 3/4 around the coin, almost splitting the coin in two parts. It definitely is not an electrotype, which at first glance it might appear to be. The most curious error we've seen. The coin is well struck and evenly worn with an even tan color.

- 1788 Cent. Ryder 17-I. Good/Very Good. A variety unknown to Ryder or Crosby! It is Ryder's obverse 4 of 1787, combined with his reverse I of 1788. We've taken the liberty of designating this new variety 17-I, to continue Ryder's numbering sequence. Ryder's last 1788 obverse was No. 14. No. 15 was later discovered combined with reverse M. No. 16 was Crosby's No. 9 that Ryder overlooked, and is also combined with reverse M. This variety was first discovered by Philip D. Greco, and published in the Colonial Newsletter (Vol. 1, No. 1, Oct. 1960), where this coin was illustrated, and described as being the better of only two known. To the best of our knowledge, no others have been discovered. Though not a beauty, it is of utmost importance to the die variety collector. PLATE
- 1788 Cent. Ryder 6-N. Fine. Not rare but the popular type without period after MASSACHUSETTS. It is pinched over COM and displays a few minor handling marks, but over-all a nice coin for this type with even wear and light brown color.
- 1788 Cent. Ryder 7-M. Good. A scarce (about R. 4) variety. Very tiny dig above head and weakness at ON. Otherwise evenly worn with the reverse stronger than the obverse.
- 85 1788 Cent. Ryder 8-C. Very Fine. A common variety, evenly struck, and well centered. Light wear and no damage. Nice surfaces and light brown color.
- 86 **1788 Cent. Ryder 8-C.** Extremely Fine. Duplicate. Only little wear but on a porous planchet, well centered and softly struck. Dark brown.
- 87 1788 Cent. Ryder 10-L. Very Fine. Another common one, but another unusual mint error. A rectangularly shaped flake is out of the planchet on the reverse, encompassing MA, tip of wing, and part of branch. This flake evidently came off before striking, since the details in that portion are well struck. Even wear and dark brown.
- 88 1788 Cent. Ryder 11-E. Very Fine. Common variety but nice type. Very slightly off-center, but affecting none of the letters. A tiny light new scratch at M of MASSACHUSETTS, otherwise just normal handling marks.
- 89 1788 Cent. Ryder 12-M. Very Good. Common variety with honest wear and counterstamped SF on the obverse.
- 90 1788 Cent. Ryder 13-N. Very Fine. The second variety lacking the period after MASSACHUSETTS. Not rare, but somehow overlooked by Crosby and not listed by him. Evenly worn and light brown. A good type coin.

#### NEW JERSEY COPPERS

91 ( ) ST. PATRICK FARTHING. Fine. Well centered and sharply struck on the obverse. The reverse weak, evenly worn and a mellowed dark brown shade.

A pleasing type coin.


#### THE UNIQUE 1786 COULTERLESS CENT MARIS 11-G

- 92 1786 Maris 11-G. No-Coulter type. THE UNIQUE MARIS PLATE COIN and THE CROSBY PLATE COIN! Dr. Maris did not have this variety in his famed collection! In his book, THE COINS OF NEW JERSEY, 1881, he stated that W. S. Appleton owned the only known specimen, and he used it for the illustration in his book. Crosby used it to illustrate the type in his book, EARLY COINS OF AMERICA, 1875, (Plate VI, No. 18). This same coin is also plated in the Red Book (Page 33) as the illustration for the no-Coulter type. To the best of our knowledge this is still THE ONLY KNOWN SPECIMEN of this variety. The Coulterless type is rarely found better than Good! As a type and variety it is of the most outstanding importance. About Uncirculated. Well centered, sharply struck, and a lovely evenly toned light brown and olive. A most exceptional opportunity for the New Jersey specialist as well as the type collector. PLATE
- 93 1786 Maris 12-G. Very Fine/Fine. Another of the rare Coulterless type. As a variety not quite as rare as the 11-G above, but still about R. 5. Except for a few light scratches, this would be better than the Maris plate coin. Very well centered and well struck, and a lovely natural light brown color. It is our opinion that this must rank as the second or third finest known. PLATE
- 94 1786 Maris 15-L. Very Good. The normal type, small planchet, plain shield. Very scarce as a variety and difficult to find in better condition. A small edge nick at about 3 o'clock, and two tiny scratches before P on the reverse. A later state of the dies where the bulge under EA is becoming apparent. Evenly worn and a nicely toned dark brown.
- 95 **1786 Maris 16-L.** Fine. Normal type and common variety. Late state with the die break at the rim between R E. Well centered and sharply struck. A few digs on the obverse. The reverse shows a few very minor edge nicks. Otherwise a clean coin.



- 96 1786 Maris 17-b. Struck over 1787 Connecticut. Very Fine. The full date of the undertype, 1787, can plainly be seen to the right of the plow. Most of the letters of CONNEC can be seen above E \* PLUR. The New Jersey striking is very sharp, obverse and reverse, and on a smooth broad planchet. The lines in the shield are full and sharp. An appealing even light brown color, and must rank among the better known specimens of this scarce variety. PLATE
- 97 1786 Maris 24-P. Very Fine. Another very pretty coin. Not rare, but somewhat scarce. The date is full and complete, which is unusual for this variety. Evenly toned light brown with no blemishes. This also must be one of the better known specimens of this variety. PLATE
- 98 1787 Maris 28-L. Fine. Fairly common variety. Well centered and well struck. Tiny dig in the field above the plow, and with a few minor edge dinges. Somewhat mottled brown in color.
- Rarity 6. Though this piece was the plate coin in the book, THE COINS OF NEW JERSEY, by Dr. Maris, it was evidently borrowed from Mr. Appleton for that purpose, as was the 11-G (Lot 92 above). This is evidenced by the fact that the Dr. Maris coin which was sold with his collection by Henkels (June 21, 1886, Lot 433) was described as, "Very Good, nicked," and was purchased by John Work Garrett. It is now in the cabinet of JOHN HOPKINS UNIVERSITY. This Massachusetts Historical Society coin has a slight planchet defect at the last A on the obverse. It is well struck and well centered, and an even light brown color. Unless a better one has turned up since, of which we are not aware, this has to be considered THE FINEST KNOWN!

  Another exceptional opportunity for the collector of New Jersey coppers. PLATE
- 1787 Maris 48-g. Fine. The Pronounced Outline to Shield variety. Not rare, but a distinct type. Well centered. Slight weakness in striking on the left side. A tiny nick at the first 7 of date, and a small edge nick above E on the reverse. Light brown and even wear.
- 101 1787 Maris 48-g. Good. A duplicate, but the late state of the dies showing the break through the shield. The same left side weakness in striking as above, but more advanced, so that the date is now barely visible. Well centered on a grainy surface dark brown.
- 1788 Maris 49-f. Head left. Very Good. Evidently a very late state of the dies with a massive triangular shaped break in the field behind the horse head, with the apex terminating at R. A die state which has not come to our attention previously. The dies are bulged as usual but the legends are complete. Outside of a tiny dark stain in the horse's mane, the coin is mainly an even soft brown color. Though a distinct type with the head left, the specialist should be more interested in this piece for the state of the dies. PLATE
- 103 1787 Maris 55-m. Very Fine. A very scarce variety and very interesting as a type, being one of our very early die-cutter errors. The second U of PLURIBUS is over an S. Had this error not been caught in time it would have been another PLURIBS variety. Well centered and well struck on a slightly flaky planchet but in exceptional condition for this variety, and PROBABLY IN THE CONDITION CENSUS. A medium chestnut brown. PLATE

- 1787 Maris 56-n. Fine. Struck over a British Halfpenny. The dateline of the undertype crosses the tops of the letters AESAR, and the letters BRI of the undertype can be seen immediately following. The indication of the undertype on the reverse is weak. A few minor digs on the reverse, but otherwise a clean coin, about medium dark brown.
- 1787 Maris 60-p. Fine. The PLURIBS type. Very scarce indeed as a variety and type. Usually seen in poor condition. Though the head is slightly weak as usual, because of the shallow die cutting, the mane, showing the individual hairs, is very distinct. The reverse is very sharp. One of the better specimens of this type and variety. Dark brown. PLATE
- 1787 Maris 61-p. Fine The scarcer of the two PLURIBS varieties. Another remarkable coin. Well centered and well struck, and a very early die state. The break behind the horse head is very small indeed. All the hairs on the mane are sharp and clear as are the date and legends. This also must rank in the condition census, especially in this early die state that we haven't seen before. PLATE
- 107 **1787 Maris 62-q.** Extremely Fine. A common variety but a lovely example of the large planchet type. Very sharply struck on a smooth broad planchet. No damage. A coin that's seen very little wear, but was recolored years ago. A magnificent type coin that would be very difficult indeed to improve. **PLATE**
- 108 1787 Maris 63-s. Fine. Another common one of the large planchet type. Mostly a medium brown with some mottled areas.
- 109 **1787 Maris 64-t.** Good. A common variety, the reverse being stronger than the obverse. A real early Love Token having the initials IMD engraved on the plow, and MK-1820 on the shield.
- 1788 Maris 67-v. Extremely Fine. Another common variety but in very nice condition. There are a few very minor edge nicks only evident on the obverse. The date, legends, and devices are all sharp, the shield showing every horizontal and vertical line. A pleasing chestnut brown and a lovely type coin. PLATE
- 1788 Maris 77-dd. Fine. The Running Fox Variety. Scarce as a variety and type in any sort of decent shape. This is somewhat weakly struck on the left side, mostly noticeable on the reverse letters E \* PLU. The fox is weak but stronger than the letters mentioned. The obverse lettering is strong as is the horse head and date. One small dig in the upper part of the shield. Over-all, a clean coin with a dark brown color. Well above the average seen for this type and variety. PLATE





1788 Maris 78-dd. Extremely Fine. Though of the same dies as above, Dr. Maris assigned it a new number because of the heavy "break." Actually this specimen shows that the defect is really severe damage to the die because a perfect set of denticles can be seen in the raised portion of the so-called break on the mane. A truly superb coin, with every detail very sharp and clear. The horse and mane in full relief and all horizontal and vertical lines of the shield very sharp. Struck on a splendid glossy planchet and an appealing olive brown color. A fitting coin with which to end this excellent offering of New Jersey coppers. PLATE


#### CONNECTICUT

- 1785 Miller 1-E. Very Fine. Rarity 4. A small planchet defect and small nick on the rim under the bust not affecting any of the design of this exceptionally nice specimen. The variety with long fillet ends and small date and letters on the reverse. Everything sharp and clear including the hair, wreath and mail. A light chestnut brown. Far above the average seen. PLATE
- 1785 Miller 2-A. 1. Very Fine. Rarity 3. The bust in the Roman style. About the best specimen of this variety to come to our attention in a long time. All details well struck up including the date. A tiny defect in the planchet on the rim at about 3o'clock affecting none of the lettering. A very dark brown. Worthy of a position in any cabinet. PLATE
- 1785 Miller 3.1-A. 3. Very Fine. Rarity 3. Another far above average specimen for the variety. The shield especially sharp showing all three grapevines clearly. The drapery and folds of the skirt also sharp. There are a few minor rim planchet defects, one just reaching O, one affecting the right upright on N of INDE, and a third weakening the head of the reverse figure. Much better than the mention of these defects makes it appear. Mostly smooth surfaces and a warm medium brown. PLATE
- 1785 Miller 3.1-L. Very Fine. Rarity 4. Still another outstanding 1785. A planchet defect at TO and another on the cheek. The reverse surprisingly clean and very sharply struck. Nice medium brown with smooth surfaces. PLATE
- 1785 Miller 3.4-F. 1. Very Fine. Rarity 3. Another exceptionally clean coin for a 1785. The planchet slightly squared off under the bust, affecting no letters or other details. Struck on a lightly granular planchet but free of any defects. Park brown. Better than most we have seen. PLATE
- 1785 Miller 3.4-F. 2. Very Fine. Rarity 3. The B weakly cut giving it the appearance of an R. Free of any appreciable defects. Well struck and perfectly centered. A lovely light brown and one that would be difficult to improve. PLATE



- 1785 Miller 3.5-B. Very Fine. Rarity 2. Of low rarity but another splendid coin. Only modest wear on the hair. The mail in full sharpness. The reverse displays only a minor planchet defect in the waist. Well centered and well struck except for some light weakness on the skirt and shield. An attractive light brown. The specialist as well as the type collector will envy the new owner of this piece. PLATE
- 1785 Miller 4.3-A. 2. Extremely Fine. Rarity 3. An outstandingly clean coin, perfectly centered and sharply struck, with only the slightest flake in the field opposite the chin. An almost imperceptible rim nick under the bust. Neither of these minor faults detracts from the beauty of this lovely specimen. An even warm light brown throughout. PLATE
- 1785 Miller 5.1-F. 5. Very Fine. Rarity 4. This specimen exhibits only the tiniest die flaw at the rim to the left point of mail on the obverse, but a serious one from the rim through the 1 of the date on the reverse. Another thin one from the rim vertically down to the branch, but not affecting it perceptibly. Otherwise very well struck and centered, and still far above average. Light and dark brown. PLATE
- 1785 Miller 4.4-C, and duplicate 5.1-F.5. Good. Both Rarity 4. Both having seen a medium amount of honest wear, the first with two small planchet defects, the other with only one minor defect. Not gems, but both very acceptable specimens. Should be seen to be appreciated. 2 pieces.
- 1785 Miller 6.2-F.1. Extremely Fine. Rarity 4. About equal in sharpness and wear to the Miller plate coin, but on a granular planchet and a planchet defect about the size of a letter before the I of INDE not affecting any letter or part of the design. Well centered and sharply struck up, with no damage, or nicks. A medium to dark brown and another exceptional coin for this series. PLATE
- 1785 Miller 8-D. Fair-Good. Rarity 6. The rarer of the two BUST LEFT varieties, having colons in the obverse legend. The obverse die has bulged considerably. In addition the coin has seen a good deal of wear. A light planchet defect in the field under OR. The mail, date, branch, legends, punctuation and ornament are all clear, though not all sharp. But still a highly desirable coin. Miller states, "One of the rarest types of 1785. Crosby found only one."

  A mixed light and dark brown. PLATE
- 1786 Miller 2.1-A. Very Fine. Rarity 3. THE RED BOOK PLATE COIN illustrating the ET-LIB INDE variety (Page 28). Not rare but very popular as an interesting type. A lovely specimen. Despite the bend in the coin it was evidently the best that the Red Book could find to illustrate. A nice dark brown, with all details sharp. PLATE
- 1786 Miller 5.10-P. Fine. Rarity 5. A rare variety and difficult to find in any condition. This one, in the later state of the dies, has TOR and part of 1, as well as 17, the foot and I of INDE obliterated by the bulge. The other parts of the coin are well struck up. There are a few defects in the planchet, the only important one being on the reverse. An excellent coin for the specialist interested in die states. A medium brown.



- 1787 Miller 1.2-C. Extremely Fine. Rarity 3. The celebrated MUTTONHEAD or sometimes called the BRADFORD HEAD. Mailed bust facing right. After studying this coin and the next, we feel that because of the weakness of the letters, date, and some parts of the design, this die was first cut very shallow, and then later recut to make a much stronger impression. Though it is evident that this coin has seen very little wear, many of the letters and date are very weak and some not struck up at all. However, the design is complete in all of its delicate details. Only a very minimum amount of wear seen on the very high spots of the coin. A superb specimen on a light brown planchet with excellent surfaces. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 1.2-C. Very Good. We do not consider this a duplicate because of the sharpness of the letters and date. This coin has seen some wear yet the letters are very strong, the details of the mail are stronger and it appears that a few details have been added. The face is bulged evidently due to wear or buckling of the dies. The Miller plate coin is of this strengthened die and shows the same bulging. The reverse is marred by two serious nicks at ET. Curiously enough, the Miller plate coin has the same sort of nick on the obverse. Though worn we feel that this coin is of utmost importance in the study of the dies of this series and perhaps should carry a new attribution number. A darkish medium brown. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 2-B and 33.7-r.2. Good to Very Good. The first, the Mailed bust facing left, Rarity 3. Evenly worn with a few minor digs. The dies are upset and show indications of clashing. The second, the Draped bust facing left. Though common has all details sharp and clear and shows moderate wear, and is a nice clean coin. An excellent opportunity for the type collector to add two different nice type coins to his set. 2 pieces.
- 130 1787 Miller 4-L. Mailed bust left. The Horned Bust variety. About Uncirculated. Not rare, but a superbly sharp well struck specimen, with only the lightest wear seen on only the very high points. Every detail very sharp. The die break that forms the horn is at full length and sharp. A most pleasant light brown with smooth glossy surfaces. PLATE
- 131 1787 Miller 6.1-M. Mailed bust left. The Laughing Head. Very Fine. Another common but popular type. This coin from delicately cut dies is well centered and well struck on a comparatively clean planchet. It is nicely toned being light brown on the high portions and dark brown in the lower areas. A very pleasing coin indeed.
- 1787 Miller 8-O. Mailed bust left. Fine. Rarity 3. The obverse is off-center so that only two of the last group of four dots are on the coin, and the tops of AUCT are off. The two groups of four dots at the wreath and above the head are sharp and clear as are the three fillet ends. It is weakly struck on the left side of the obverse, but the top and right side are exceptionally strong. The reverse is fairly well centered with the date partly off the coin. The dies are ½ upset. All details, except as mentioned, are clear. A light and dark brown color.
- 1787 Miller 11.1-E. Mailed bust left. Very Fine. Very well struck and centered, on a somewhat flaky but very thick planchet (169½ gr.). Not a rare coin, but rarely found so well struck and in such nice shape. A few very minor rim nicks but over-all an excellent coin. Medium brown. PLATE

- 1787 Miller 11.2-K. Rarity 3. Mailed bust left. Very Good. Another of the same style, well centered and well struck with a small mint lip which adds to the denticles on the obverse but lops off about half of the E of INDE and the star following it on the reverse. A flake in the planchet at the nose and eye. Even wear, and an over-all nice dark brown coin.
- 1787 Miller 12-Q. Rarity 4. The overdate. Mailed bust left. Extremely Fine. A splendid example of this scarce and popular coin which has the first 7 of the date clearly cut over an 8, and INDE spaced IN DE with the branch in the space between. A late state of the dies showing the reverse breaks clearly and CONNEC showing the effects of clashing. All details sharp and clear with two of the three grapevines showing. The overdate is very sharp. One of the best examples we've handled. A warm light brown. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 13-D. Rarity 3. Mailed bust left. Very Fine. Another well struck coin, ever so slightly off-center. Tiny planchet clip at 3 o'clock affecting nothing. Late state, showing the bulge in the field in front of face and at ON. The tops of the letters INDE ET are off the planchet. Though the obverse seems to have seen very little wear, the reverse appears to have seen a bit more. Not rare, but in excellent shape for this variety. A glossy dark brown. PLATE
- 137 Miller 14-H. Rarity 3. Mailed bust left. Very Fine. The variety with a very small date with a pheon on either side of it. Very slightly off-center so that the bottom of the pheon past the date is off the planchet, otherwise nothing else is affected. A planchet defect at the rim affecting the top of T of AUCTORI. Well struck with full mail and most other details sharp. Dark brown. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 15-S. Good to Very Good. Rarity 6. Mailed bust left. The very rare and unusual variety. The only obverse with the CONNECT spelling. The reverse is the INDL ET LIB, with cinquefoils at either side of the date. Crosby (Page 216) knew of only one specimen! Miller (Page 40) mentions "the few specimens known of this very rare die are all in poor condition." Crosby also mentioned that the branch appeared to be more like a bouquet, and in looking at this coin carefully, it does appear so. The heavy reverse die break that appears on all known specimens only obliterates the B and about half of the I. Though well worn, all of the details are clear, and this would have to rank among the better known specimens. An unusual opportunity for the type collector and specialist, as this is lacking in many major collections. A medium to dark brown. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 22-g.2. Fine. Rarity 5. Draped bust facing left as are all of the following 1787's. The bust and reverse figure are somewhat softly struck, but the lettering, date, and branch are sharp. Well centered. A few very minor reverse edge nicks. Even wear with some pitting that can only be seen under a glass, and a very thin light scratch across the bust. A very desirable coin for a Rarity 5 (which is about Rarity 7 on the Sheldon scale). Dark brown on a granular surface. PLATE
- 140 1787 Miller 24-FF. Very Fine. Rarity 6. A weakly struck coin but of excessive rarity. AUCT and NEC are very weak but the bust, especially the upper part is strong. The reverse only has strength at the lower portion which is very clear including a strong date. A variety that is lacking in many collections. The obverse is smooth and the reverse somewhat granular dark brown. PLATE

- 1787 Miller 31.1-gg.1. Very Good. Rarity 3. The ET LIR variety. Not rare but a clean specimen except for a small unimportant planchet defect on the lower portion of the reverse figure. Well centered and well struck with INDE ET LIR especially sharp. A very popular type. Light brown and nice surfaces.
- 142 1787 Miller 31.2-r.3. Very Fine. Ever so slightly off-center with all letters and design entirely on the planchet. A common variety but a lovely clean type coin. Light brown.
- 143 **1787 Miller 32.2-X.2** and **33.2-Z.5.** Fine. Two common varieties and both make excellent type coins. The second has an interesting die break on the reverse. 2 pieces.
- 1787 Miller 33.6-KK. Fine. The variety with 3 fillet ends. Not rare, but popular. Slightly off-center with the lower portion of the date off the planchet. A dark stain at RI and a very thin light scratch across the shield. Otherwise a clean light brown.
- 145 **1787 Miller 33.7-r.2.** Very Fine. A common variety but a lovely perfectly centered and well struck type coin. Everything sharp and clear with smooth surfaces and a pleasant light brown.
- 1787 Miller 33.10-Z.8. Fine. Rarity 4. High edges on both sides which preserved the details from wear. Well struck and all details sharp. The lower portion of the date is off the planchet. An excellent specimen for this very scarce variety.





- 147 (1787) Miller 33.17 BROCKAGE. Extremely Fine. A most unusual and rare item. Perfectly centered and sharply struck. The reverse shows the intaglio impression of the obverse also perfectly centered and in full sharpness. (This error occurs very rarely when a properly struck coin is not ejected from the dies, and a new planchet is inserted on top of the previously struck coin. When the next striking occurs the first coin acts as a reverse die and produces its design in intaglio, while the obverse die strikes properly). An appealing medium to light brown with clean surfaces. Very Rare. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 33.7-r.2, 33.17-r.1, and 33.17-gg.2. Good. None rare, the first two being the normal type and the third the ET-LIR variety. All dark brown and about average. 3 pieces.
- 149 1787 Miller 33.20-Z.9. Fine. Rarity 4. Unusually shaped planchet but nothing except the bottom of the 1 of date off the flan. A nice well struck and unusually clean specimen for this scarce variety. Light brown.

- 1787 Miller 33.23-Z.4, and 33.28-Z.16. Rarity 2 and 3 respectively. The first Fine, off-center with the very bottom of the bust of the obverse and top of the hair of the figure of the reverse off the planchet. However, that leaves a full sharp date showing the 1 and both 7's entering the denticles. A nice clean medium brown. The second Good, well centered and struck and though worn shows full legend and all details with the most interesting die break starting at the rim behind the head, piercing it and emerging at the base of the nose. Its appearance resembles an arrow piercing the head. Dark brown. 2 pieces.
- 151 1787 Miller 33.23-hh.2. Extremely Fine. Rarity 5. Weakly struck at the bottom of the bust and correspondingly on the head of the reverse figure. Otherwise a good strike with complete hair and curls in needle-like sharpness. There are a few very minor defects in the planchet (as made). Still an exceptional coin for this rare variety in medium brown showing very little evidence of wear. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 33.30-EE. Very Fine. Another Rarity 5 item. This one slightly off-center on the obverse only. The reverse perfectly centered. Tiny defect in the planchet above head. A' very sharp even strike with all details well struck up. The second and third cinquefoils show very clearly that they have been altered from crosses. The thick lips, button nose and heavy eye strongly resemble some of the 1785 varieties. A most unusual and important variety. Nice clean surfaces and a medium to dark brown. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 33.33-Z.11. Very Good. Rarity 3. A late state of the dies showing two unlisted breaks, one from the rim through the upper right serif of the first N to the ribbon knot, and the other from the rim through the lower dot of the last colon. The reverse is the interesting variety having the B altered from an R. Small planchet defect at rim over E of INDE. Another important coin for the student of the varieties. Light brown with good clean surfaces.
- 1787 Miller 33.45-W.2. Good. Rarity 5. Another late state with heavy, unrecorded break from rim into bust. Off-center and worn with a tiny attempted puncture at 1 of date. Still a rare and important coin.
- 1787 Miller 33.48-Z.25. Good. A completely new variety and to our knowledge UNIQUE! This reverse die was unknown to Miller and was only discovered several years ago in combination with obverse 33.29. To date, to our knowledge there are only two known specimens of that variety. This specimen has that same very rare reverse die but is combined with a completely new obverse die. It lies in the 33 grouping and we are very proud to announce this new 33.48 obverse. Though worn, all of the details are sufficiently clear to positively identify these findings. A true prize for the die variety specialist. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 34-ff.1. Extremely Fine. Rarity 3. The ET-LIR variety with large fleurons on the obverse. Slight weakness in striking at about 2 o'clock and correspondingly on the reverse. Otherwise well centered and a sharp strike. The reverse figure exhibits a new and elaborate hair-do and several lines have been cut into the skirt (See Lot 158). There is a small planchet defect on the rim about 4 o'clock but not interfering with any lettering or design. An exceptional chestnut brown coin with excellent surfaces. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 33.39-s.1 and 37.1-cc.1. Very Good. Two fairly common type coins, the first dark brown and the normal draped bust type, and the second tan to light brown, the ET LIR variety. 2 pieces.

- 1787 Miller 37.5-e. Extremely Fine. Rarity 2. Though very dark and on a rough surface, close examination reveals that this coin has seen very little wear. The reverse die shows that the figure has evidently undergone some refinement. The skirt has a good many lines cut into it, perhaps for shading purposes. The hair has been restyled, though not as elaborately as seen on reverse ff.l (Lot 156). We have not noticed these refinements previously, and feel that they should open up a new area of study. Very dark brown almost bordering on black. PLATE
- 1787 Miller 37.11-ff.2 and 41-ii. Good to Very Good. Each Rarity 3. The first is the ET-LIR variety and the second AUCTOPI ET IIB (dented). Two different and distinct popular varieties. The misspellings on both are very sharp and evident, the second being much nicer and the more important of the two. 2 pieces.
- 1787 Miller 42-kk.2 and 43.1-Y. Very Good. Both fairly common but again distinct and different types. The first is another AUCTOPI ET IIB and the second CONNFC. Both are well centered and well struck and both exhibit their misspellings very sharply and clearly as well as all other lettering and die detail. An excellent opportunity for the type collector to acquire two really nice specimens. 2 pieces.
- 1788 Miller 2-D and 4.1-k. Very Good. Rarity 2 and 4 respectively. Both the Mailed Bust facing right. The first mottled by severe corrosion on about ½ of the left obverse and ½ of the left reverse. The right side of the bust is very sharp as is the entire reverse figure and date. The second shows areas of weak striking due to die failure but the bust, reverse figure and date are sharp. 2 pieces.
- 1788 Miller 4.1-B.1. Very Good. Rarity 5. Same type. This on a rough planchet. The obverse shows the evidence of clashed dies so that the date can be clearly seen incused above the head. The obverse striking is weak, the reverse sharp and showing the die break through the last star. All details of this rare reverse are sharp and clear. Very dark brown.
- 1788 Miller 7-E. Fine. Rarity 4. Mailed bust left. Slightly off-center with a defect in the planchet above the head. This is the same obverse die that was used for variety 11.1 of 1787. The tail of the R is very weak so that the legend appears to be AUCTOPI. The surfaces are rough with no apparent damage.
- 1788 Miller 8-K. Very Good. Rarity 5. Same type. Slightly off-center. CONNEC is not struck up. The balance of the obverse is sharp. The reverse shows everything including a strong full date.
- 1788 Miller 10-C. Very Fine. Rarity 5. Same type. Struck over a 1785 Nova Constellatio. Well centered and well struck on a nice broad flan. The undertype is visible in various places, with NOV right above the head so that the legend appears to read: AUCTORI NOV CONNEC. The bust is sharp and clear showing all details and has three stars from the undertype in the hair. The reverse is also very sharp showing all details with the wreath of the undertype crossing the bottom of the skirt. The letters IBER of the undertype appear under IND. A rare coin and a very unusual overstriking. PLATE



- 1788 Miller 12.2-E. Extremely Fine. Rarity 3. Same type. A very light planchet defect above the reverse figure bulges the front of the bust on the obverse. Otherwise all details and lettering sharp and clear, especially the hair and wreath. The reverse is also very sharp showing all of the folds of the drapery and skirt and the three grapevines on the shield. The reverse letters show evidence of light double striking. Not rare, hence an excellent type coin of these delicately cut dies. PLATE
- 1788 Miller 13-A.1, 16.1-D, and 16.1-H. Fair to Good. The first Mailed bust left with the CONNLC spelling (Rarity 4). Struck off-center so that most of the lettering is off the planchet. However, the important NLC are sharp and full. LIB is completely off. The other two are the Draped bust facing left types. The 16.1-D reverse having INDE ET LIB and the 16.1-H reverse INDE ET LIB. A nice group of three different styles. 3 pieces.

#### NOVA EBORAC

1787 Nova Eborac. Reverse figure facing right. Fine. Well struck and slightly off-center. The early state of the dies before the die break at the foot even started. Full strong date. Unfortunately there are several light scratches across the bust. PLATE

#### VIRGINIA

- 169 1773 Virginia. Newman 20-X. Uncirculated. The variety with period and 8 harp strings. A very pleasing glossy reddish-brown.
- 170 1773 Virginia. Newman 22-S. Uncirculated. With period and 7 harp strings. Very late state of the dies, hitherto unrecorded. The die break under the bust is sharp and clear. There is a bulge in the bust and extending into the field somewhat resembling the 1724 Rosa Americana piece. A very pleasing even chocolate brown.

#### **FUGIO**

1787 Fugio. Newman 9-P. Good. A scarce variety, weakly struck in the rays and the bottom of the reverse label. Well centered with all letters of MIND YOUR BUSINESS clear. Light brown.

# NOVA CONSTELLATIO

- 1785 Nova Constelatio. Crosby 1-B. Very Fine. Rarity 3. The variety with one L and blunt rays. The same die as was used for Crosby 3-C of 1783. Our experience leads us to believe that this is much scarcer than Crosby felt at the time he wrote the book (1873). The dies started to buckle early and it is quite rare to find a decent specimen with the full U.S. monogram. This is an especially nice one, being well centered and a rich medium brown with the full monogram and smooth surfaces. PLATE
- 173 1785 Nova Constellatio. Crosby 4-D. Fine. Rarity 6 according to Crosby, but we're inclined to bring this one down somewhat to perhaps a 5. Well centered and well struck with full monogram and all other details clear. Another medium brown.

174 1785 Crosby 5-E. Very Good-Fine. Rarity 4. Well centered and well struck except for light weakness at VA and NS. The date strong for this variety. Again, medium brown.

#### J. CHALMERS

1783 Chalmers Shilling. Short worm, reeded edge. Very Fine. Slightly off-center, but nothing off the planchet. Well struck for this charming little silver piece. In addition to being a rare colonial coin it has the added attraction of being our earliest store card or merchants token. An excellent specimen with no damage. PLATE

#### KENTUCKY

176 ( ) Kentucky Token. Plain edge. Very Fine. Well centered and sharply struck, rich deep brown and olive.

#### WASHINGTON

1783 Washington. Baker 7. Georgius Triumpho. Good. The only Washington piece of the 1783 group that was actually made at that time, the others having been made in the 1810-1820 period. The symbolism of the reverse design, showing Britannia in a cage of 13 bars held together at each corner by a fleur de lis, is most interesting. That, combined with the empirical style of the bust, leads us to feel that this coin may be of French origin. Well centered and fairly well struck for this scarce piece. Dark brown.

# ALBANY CHURCH PENNY

178 (1790) Albany Church Penny. A very rare item that is seldom offered. The last one that we recall in a public sale was the George Clapp specimen, sold by Schulman in his April 3-4, 1959 sale (Lot 1173), where it brought several hundred dollars. Uniface as struck. The variety without the "D." One appeared in the Jenks Sale, December 1921 (Lot 5507) and we quote from that catalog: "On January 4, 1790 the trustees of the First Presbyterian Church of Albany 'Resolved that 1,000 coppers be stamped CHURCH PENNY and placed with the treasurer to exchange with the members of the congregation, at the rate of 12 for one shilling,' in order to add respect to the weekly collection." It seems that there was very little small change available and most people just couldn't afford to contribute a shilling. The Jenks specimen was holed at the top. This specimen is not holed. It has a few planchet cracks at the rim, but none reach any part of the design. There are two odd half-moonlike stamps within the P. The planchet is not round, but more oblong than oval. The word CHURCH is very sharp and strong, PENNY is weak. A light brassy color. PLATE

# And His Collection

The 1804 Dollar, now called the Mickley Specimen, was included in the collection of Colonial and United States coins, American medals and paper money received by the Massachusetts Historical Society in 1905 in accordance with the terms of the will of the late Mr. William Sumner Appleton of Boston. The total bequest amounted to over 4,400 pieces. The 1804 Dollar was undoubtedly the outstanding individual coin and was so considered at the time. It should nevertheless be noted that the American material acquired by the Society represented only a part of the Appleton collection. The former owner's numismatic interest was not restricted to the coinage of his native country.

Mr. Appleton was born in Boston in 1840 of old New England stock. He was a direct descendant of Samuel Appleton, who came over in 1636. Through his mother he was related to the Coffins and the Sumners, families whose members played prominent roles in the commercial and political developments of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Graduating with the Harvard Class of 1860, he later proceeded to take an M.A. and a law degree at the same institution.

The Appletons were in easy circumstances so that it was not necessary for Mr. Appleton to practice law or engage in active business. Nevertheless, true to his New England heritage, he spent a busy and productive life. His interest in coins began in boyhood. As he grew older he developed a marked scholarly bent, devoting particular attention to the history of Boston and to the study of heraldry and genealogy. His knowledge of heraldry was so widely recognized that in 1885 he was called upon to establish the Arms and Seal of Harvard, for which he received the formal thanks of the Corporation. As early as 1870 when still a young man, he began contributing what became a highly significant series of papers dealing with American coins and medals to, "The American Journal of Numismatics." By the time of his death in 1903 he was recognized as a numismatist of formidable stature.

The splendid bequest to the Massachusetts Historical Society, and his many articles, have given Mr. Appleton the reputation of being a specialist only in the American numismatic past. He certainly devoted many years to the study of the coins and medals of this country, a field in which he became an acknowledged expert. But a sound education, coupled with the nineteenth-century New Englander's itch to travel abroad in a leisurely and discerning fashion not common today, developed wide ranging interests reflected in his collection.

His attraction to Ancient Greek coins, particularly those of Syracuse, gave great weight to his opinion on their authenticity. He was also completely at home in the Roman Imperial series. He was described as having a "singular facility for rendering into excellent English the terse Latin legends on coins and medals, and there was often a neatness and point to his versions which made them particularly happy." His cabinet also included a fine group of early crowns of the German Princely States, an area where his familiarity with heraldry was most useful. At the time of Mr. Appleton's death in 1903 his collection of coins and medals, both Ancient and modern, was described as, "one of the finest, if not the best, of those possessed by American collectors." The Ancient and Foreign portion was later sold. The example he set as a collector is one worthy of serious consideration by those interested in coins today.

# J. J. MICKLEY AND HIS DOLLAR

\_\_\_\_

There can be little doubt that full knowledge of the pedigree of a cherished coin adds greatly to the pleasure derived from its ownership. Most coins have a way of gathering anonymity very quickly, so it is not often possible to trace the record of a particular piece or to become acquainted with any of the previous owners. Of course, the well publicized 1804 Dollars have almost suffered from overexposure in a number of ways. It is only their pedigrees which do not seem to have attracted as much interest as perhaps they deserve. In our opinion the Mickley Dollar is one of the most interesting of all because Mr. Mickley was such a stimulating man. He was also a great collector.

Joseph J. Mickley was born in Catasauqua, four miles from Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, on March 24, 1799. His parents were Moravians of Huguenot origins. The family name of Michelet was first Germanized into Mueckli and then Anglicized as Mickley. Earlier in the century one writer noted, "They had sore times among the Indians — without any fault of their own." The young Joseph was given a substantial education, for which the Moravians were famous, and showed a marked talent for learning languages. He virtually grew up fluent in French and classical German. Later in life his mastery of Swedish, Russian, Greek, Italian and Spanish, proved a great asset in his extensive travels through Europe, deep into Russia and to the borders of Asia and Africa.

Mr. Mickley's first trip, and possibly the most important, took place in his early teens when he left the Pennsylvania Dutch countryside for Philadelphia, where he set about learning the art of piano making. Eventually he went into the business for himself and prospered. He even became an acknowledged music critic and had the reputation for being the best mender of musical instruments in the United States. He maintained an interest in working with his hands until late in life. As a friend observed, he appeared to keep up his work, "for the pleasure and healthfulness of employment. It is not too easy to understand on other grounds, why a man who was constantly importing costly coins and buying scarce books, should care for the compensation of tuning pianos and putting harps and violins in order. He was, however, the agent for the sale of a popular make of pianos, having a stock of them in his house." It also seems likely that the agency was too profitable for him to abandon cheerfully.

There have been many books about the various facets of numismatics published in recent years. One aspect of the general subject has been strangely neglected. Little effort has been made to explore the origins of the hobby of coin collecting in this country, and even less is known about who the first collectors were. The 1804 Dollar by pure chance has thrown enough indirect light on our early collectors to show that there is perhaps more to be discovered. The owner of the first Dollar, Mr. Matthew Stickney, began to buy coins after 1815 and considered himself the first date collector, as such, of the U.S. series. Mr. Joseph J. Mickley began about the same time. We know how he got started, thanks to a friend, none other than Mr. W. E. Dubois of the U.S. Mint. This gentleman wrote in 1871. "Do you know what started him (Mickley) in the coin-collecting furor? Many years ago, when he cared no more for coins than the rest of mankind do, he heard that the cent of 1799 was very rare. That was the year he was born in. A cent of that year he must have; and he got it."

The exact year Mr. Mickley began his historic search for a 1799 cent was later made clear. It was about 1816 when he was already in Philadelphia and seventeen years old. "No doubt 'the thing' was in him but that was what brought it to the surface; and probably it proved a great incentive to the study of languages, history and antiquities, as a diversion from the daily labor of making pianos and repairing violins." There can be no better description of the basic functions of a hobby in a man's life and the benefits properly derived from it, than that. Some collectors even follow the same healthy and sensible pattern today although perhaps not as many as there should be. Joseph Mickley's interest in coins eventually progressed to old books, many of which were numismatic, but not all. The section of his library covering the early Swedish settlements in America and the history of Philadelphia was well known even in Europe.

Oddly enough, Mr. Mickley, like Mr. Appleton of Boston, is now considered to have been a great specialist in U.S. coins. Both of them were, but only up to a point. In each case the value of the American material in their collections was worth somewhat less than half that of the whole. In one sense the total value of each can tell us very little because the coin price structure has altered so radically in recent years. Nevertheless, the figures are of interest for the purposes of comparing the Mickley and Appleton collections, both of which contained the same 1804 Dollar. Before the former was broken up it was estimated at about \$30,000. In 1903 the trustees of the Appleton estate valued the coins at \$40,000. In the intervening forty odd years the dollar probably increased in purchasing power slightly. At the same time it must be remembered that prices in the 1860's and 1870's were always quoted in "greenback" dollars and therefore were depreciated in relation to the gold coinage of the times. When these factors are taken into consideration it would seem that the totals in question give an accurate picture of the two collections. Mr. Appleton's was a bit broader in scope.

We don't know as much about the nature of the Mickley holdings as we would like. He suffered a serious robbery. The thief took "as much as a man could carry," including most of his British and foreign coins in all metals as well as some American duplicates. Fortunately the major group of United States coins was left untouched. By 1867, however, Mr. Mickley's interests were undergoing a change. "His taste seemed to modulate from coins to coin-books, which shifting seems likely to occur with old collectors," as W. E. Dubois put it. As a result he decided to sell. The well known dealer W. Elliot Woodward catalogued the coins and the Sale took place on October 28, 1867. The collection brought about \$15,000, a lot of money in those days.

Joseph J. Mickley survived until 1878, when he suffered from a strangely modern-sounding ailment, a heart attack. It carried him off in the fullness of his years. A friend wrote, "...Mr. Mickley was an agreeable man to associate with, and an honorable man to deal with...He was eminently sincere, affable, kind, and gentle; yet decided, and with a mind of his own. In the best sense of the word he was a gentleman; not with artificial elegance of manners, yet with a good address, rendering him agreeable to refined society." A tribute like that had to be earned. If something of such personal reputation has rubbed off on the Mickley 1804 Dollar, the new owner may gain more than a choice addition to his collection. At least he will become part of a great line, not only of distinguished numismatists, but outstanding personalities as well. While it is true that all the 1804 Dollars have an interesting past, it seems to us that this particular specimen has been more closely connected with the history of our national coinage, and the best traditions of collecting in the United States, than most. The pedigree of the piece gives it a special personality all its own.

# THE MICKLEY CLASS I 1804 DOLLAR

The Mickley Class I 1804 Dollar is reputed to have been received in 1850 in the normal course of business by Henry C. Young, then a teller of the Bank of Pennsylvania. Although the exact date is not known, the Dollar was purchased by Mr. Joseph J. Mickley of Philadelphia a short time after its discovery. It remained in his possession until his collection was sold on October 28, 1867. Mr. W. Elliot Woodward, the cataloguer, described the coin as follows:

"No. 1696. This piece is regarded by all American collectors as the gem of Mr. Mickley's collection. It has been in circulation, but it is still in the finest condition, retaining its brilliancy of surface, and being entirely uninjured. It was obtained many years ago from the Bank of Pennsylvania and is beyond question, not only genuine, but original. Of the four specimens known, two, it is certain, were struck at a period subsequent to 1804, and till one was recently obtained by Col. Cohen, from Richmond, this was supposed to be the only original one existing; scarce."

The coin is graded by Newman and Bressett in their, "The Fantastic 1804 Dollar" as:

"Very nearly uncirculated [with a] nice steel tone [showing] slight friction on the high points. Normal die alignment. Edge lettering crushed."

The coin was first purchased by Mr. W. A. Liliendahl and then by Mr. Edward Cogan, who in turn sold it to Mr. William Sumner Appleton in February 1868. The Dollar remained in the Appleton collection until transferred to the Massachusetts Historical Society in 1905 along with all his other coins, medals, paper money and books, "relating in any way to the Territory now comprised in the United States of America, or to the history thereof, or any organization therein, or to any citizens thereof..." On June 7, 1967 the Probate Court of Suffolk County Massachusetts, authorized the eventual sale of duplicates and other pieces not directly associated with the primary research functions of the Society in the field of American history. In accordance with this authorization the Trustees of the Society decided to make the Mickley Dollar available for sale.

It can be pointed out for the connoisseur of dates as well as of rare coins that the Mickley Dollar first came to the attention of the numismatic public at large on October 28, 1867. It will be sold on October 24, 1970, just four days short of 103 years later. For slightly longer than 110 years the coin has remained in only three major collections, those of Mickley, Appleton, and the Massachusetts Historical Society. The last Class I 1804 Dollar available to collectors was the Dexter Specimen sold in 1950.
